





Executive Summary

2022 Kirksville Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment Survey Executive Summary

Overview

ETC Institute administered a Parks and Recreation Needs Survey for the City of Kirksville during the months of spring 2022. The survey will help the City of Kirksville Parks and Recreation Department plan for future recreation programs and facilities that meet the community's needs and preferences.

Methodology

ETC Institute mailed a survey packet to a random sample of households in the City of Kirksville. Each survey packet contained a cover letter, a copy of the survey, and a postage-paid return envelope. Residents who received the survey were given the option of returning the survey by mail or completing it online at *KirksvilleSurvey.org*.

After the surveys were mailed, ETC Institute followed up by sending text messages to encourage participation. The text messages contained a link to the online version of the survey to make it easy for residents to complete the survey. To prevent people who were not residents of the City of Kirksville from participating, everyone who completed the survey online was required to enter their home address prior to submitting the survey. ETC Institute then matched the addresses that were entered online with the addresses that were originally selected for the random sample. If the address from a survey completed online did not match one of the addresses selected for the sample, the online survey was not included in the final database for this report.

A total of 302 households participated in the survey. The overall results for the sample of 302 households have a precision of at least +/-5.5 at the 95% level of confidence.

This report contains the following:

- Charts showing the overall results of the survey (Section 2)
- Priority Investment Rating (PIR) that identifies priorities for facilities and programs (Section 3)
- Tabular data showing the overall results for all questions on the survey (Section 4)

The major findings of the survey are summarized on the following pages.

Parks and Recreation Facilities and Programs Use

Satisfaction with Facilities. Respondents were asked to rate their overall satisfaction with 12 Kirksville Parks and Facilities. Each of the items mostly received satisfied or very satisfied ratings. Respondents most often said they were "very satisfied" with Kirksville Aquatic Center (46%), Rotary Park (44%), and Forest Lake (41%).

Use of Facilities. Respondents were asked to select all the facilities and parks their household had visited. Brashear Park (65%), Forest Lake (64%), and Rotary Park (57%) were the most popular selections. When asked to select which three parks or facilities should be prioritized, the same three were selected most often.

Access to Facilities. Respondents were asked if they lived within a 10-minute walk to a park from their residence. Most respondents (55%) said yes. Of those who do not live within a 10 minute walk, 35% would need to walk 30 minutes or more and 31% said 16 to 20 minutes. Fifty-four percent (54%) of respondents have a pedestrian route to access a park but 17% of those respondents say it needs improvement.

Participation in Programs. Respondents were if their household had participated in Kirksville recreation programs during the past two years. Most respondents (61%) had not participated. Of those who had participated, 70% had done 1-3 programs. Those respondents most often rated programs as good (52%) followed by excellent (30%). Respondents were most satisfied with the location of programs, quality of instructors, and quality of facility where program is offered.

Facilities Used for Programs. Respondents were asked to select all the facilities their household used for recreation activities. Thousand Hills State Park (81%), City of Kirksville (57%), and Missouri Department of Conservation (46%) were selected most often.

Communication Methods. Respondents most often learned about recreation programs and activities from friends and neighbors (52%), social media (50%), or the city newsletter (47%). Respondents most prefer social media (48%), city newsletter (36%), and local news (33%) as means of communication.


Barriers to use. Respondents were asked to indicate why they did not use facilities and programs or did not use them more often. The highest number of respondents said they did not know what was offered (36%), a lack of sidewalk or trail access (32%), and physical health limitations (19%).

Value of Parks and Recreation

Perception of Value. Most respondents (64%) say they are either somewhat satisfied (48%) or very satisfied (16%) with the overall value they receive from parks and recreation. Most respondents (51%) also think given the COVID-19 pandemic, their perception of value for parks and recreation has somewhat increased (29%) or significantly increased (22%).

Allocation of Funding. Respondents were asked to allocate a \$100 budget for parks and recreation. The highest amount of funding (\$34.90) went to improvements and maintenance of existing parks and facilities followed by new indoor recreation facilities (\$22.38) and new walking/biking trails (\$16.51). Respondents most often said funding should increase for parks and recreation (42%) followed by staying the same (33%).

Overall Benefits of Parks and Recreation. Respondents were asked rate their level of agreement with 13 statements regarding the benefits of parks and recreation. Respondents most often agreed (either agreed or strongly agreed) that parks and recreation makes Kirksville a more desirable place to live (73%), improves their households physical health and fitness (67%), and preserves open space and protects the environment (67%). Results for each of the statements is shown in the chart below. Most respondents feel it's very important (74%) for the City of Kirksville to provide high quality parks and recreation programs and facilities.




Facilities and Amenities Needs and Priorities

Facility/Amenity Needs: Respondents were asked to identify if their household had a need for 36 facilities/amenities and to rate how well their needs for each were currently being met. Based on this analysis, ETC Institute was able to estimate the number of households in the community that had the greatest "unmet" need for various facilities/amenities.

The three facilities/amenities with the highest estimated number of households that have an unmet need:

- 1. Indoor running/walking tracks 2,384 households
- 2. Community centers/recreation centers 2,017 households
- 3. Community/social gathering spaces 2,012 households



Facilities and Amenities Importance: In addition to assessing the needs for each facility/amenity, ETC Institute also assessed the importance that residents placed on each item. Based on the sum of respondents' top four choices, these were the four most important amenities to residents:

- 1. Walking & Biking Trails (36%)
- 2. Indoor running/walking tracks (19%)
- 3. Community centers/recreation centers (18%)
- 4. Community/social gathering spaces (18%)

The percentage of residents who selected each facility/amenity as one of their top four choices is shown in the chart below.




Priorities for Facility Investments: The Priority Investment Rating (PIR) was developed by ETC Institute to provide organizations with an objective tool for evaluating the priority that should be placed on recreation and parks investments. The Priority Investment Rating (PIR) equally weights (1) the importance that residents place on amenities/facilities and (2) how many residents have unmet needs for the facility/amenity. [Details regarding the methodology for this analysis are provided in Section 3 of this report.]

Based the Priority Investment Rating (PIR), the following parks and recreation facilities/amenities were rated as high priorities for investment:

- Walking & biking trails (PIR= 180)
- Indoor running/walking tracks (PIR= 153)
- Community centers/recreation centers (PIR= 135)
- Community/social gathering spaces (PIR= 135)
- Restrooms (PIR= 110)



Based on this analysis, ETC Institute was able to estimate the number of households in the community that had the greatest "unmet" need for various facilities/amenities.

The three programs with the highest estimated number of households that have an unmet need:

- 1. Adult fitness & wellness programs 2,679 households
- 2. History & museums 1,935 households
- 3. Senior programs— 1,827 households








Q1. Parks and Facilities Used by Households







Q1b. Satisfaction with Parks/Facilities

by percentage of respondents who have used park/facility (excluding "N/A")





Q2. Which Parks/Facilities Should Be Prioritized Over the Next 2 Years






Q4. Do you have a pedestrian route (trails, sidewalks) to safely access the closest park to your household?






Q5b. Rating Overall Quality of Programs

by percentage of respondents (excluding "not provided")











Q9. Most Preferred Communication Methods

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top three choices




Q10a. Estimated Number of Households in Kirksville Who Have a Need for Facility/ Amenity


Q10b. How Well Need For Facility / Amenity Is Currently Being Met

by percentage of respondents who answered "Yes" to Q10




Q10c. Estimated Number of Households in Kirksville Whose Facility/ Amenity Needs are Only Partly or Not Met




Q11. Most Important Facility/Amenity to Households

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top four choices




Q12a. Estimated Number of Households in Kirksville Who Have a Need for Recreation Programs





Q12b. How Well Need For Recreation Program Is Currently Being Met


Q12c. Estimated Number of Households in Kirksville Whose Recreation Program Needs are Only Partly or Not Met






Q13. Most Important Recreation Programs to Households

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top four choices




Q14. With a Budget of \$100, How Would Respondents Allocate Funds for Parks and Recreation?


Q15. Level of Agreement With Benefits of Parks and Recreation


Q16. How important do you feel it is for the City of Kirksville to provide high quality parks and recreation programs and facilities?




Q17. Level of Satisfaction with Overall Value from Parks and Recreation



Q18. Given the recent COVID-19 Pandemic, how has you and your household's perception of the value of parks, trails, open spaces, and recreation changed?






Q20. Counting yourself, how many people in your household are in the following age groups?







Priority Investment Rating

Priority Investment Rating Kirksville, Missouri

The **Priority Investment Rating (PIR)** was developed by ETC Institute to provide governments with an objective tool for evaluating the priority that should be placed on parks and recreation investments. The Priority Investment Rating was developed by ETC Institute to identify the facilities and programs residents think should receive the highest priority for investment. The priority investment rating reflects the importance residents place on items (sum of top 4 choices) and the unmet needs (needs that are not met or only partly met) for each facility/program relative to the facility/program that rated the highest overall. Since decisions related to future investments should consider both the level of unmet need and the importance of facilities and programs, the PIR weights each of these components equally.

The PIR reflects the sum of the Unmet Needs Rating and the Importance Rating as shown in the equation below:

PIR = UNR + IR

For example, the Unmet Needs Rating for senior programs is 68.2 (out of 100) and the Importance Rating for senior programs is 80.1 (out of 100), the Priority Investment Rating for art programs is 148.3 (out of 200).

How to Analyze the Charts:


- High Priority Areas are those with a PIR of at least 100. A rating of 100 or above generally indicates there is a relatively high level of unmet need and residents generally think it is important to fund improvements in these areas. Improvements in this area are likely to have a positive impact on the greatest number of households.
- Medium Priority Areas are those with a PIR of 50-99. A rating in this range generally
 indicates there is a medium to high level of unmet need or a significant percentage of
 residents generally think it is important to fund improvements in these areas.
- Low Priority Areas are those with a PIR below 50. A rating in this range generally
 indicates there is a relatively low level of unmet need and residents do not think it is
 important to fund improvements in these areas. Improvements may be warranted if
 the needs of very specialized populations are being targeted.




Importance Rating for Recreation Amenities


Top Priorities for Investment for Recreation Amenities Based on the Priority Investment Rating




Importance Rating for Recreation Programs
