### **BUDGET CALENDAR**

Councilmember Chrisman is not able to meet on Saturday, September 18 and would not be able to meet the Saturday prior. Would you be interested in meeting possibly Wednesday or Thursday, September 15 or 16 from 4:00 to 7:00 or 8:00 pm? The next dates would be November 15 and 16 as possible dates to review the budget. Newsletter. I had not heard from any other member, so I have assumed all dates were fine. Please check your calendars so we can find a suitable time within our tight timeline to meet.

### **SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING**

The City Council will need to have a Special City Council meeting on August 30 to set the property tax levy. The Council was planning to have the first meeting in September on Tuesday, September 7 due to the Labor Day Holiday. The Council may be more agreeable to have the meeting on August 30, one week earlier.

### **BATTLE OF KIRKSVILLE REQUEST**

On Friday, August 6, the first of three annual events occurred to recognize the Battle of Kirksville. There was a great turnout and a lot of community support. Councilmember Chrisman and Battle of Kirksville Committee Chair was asked if the City would be interested in giving a letter of support for a proposed reenactment of the Battle of Kirksville. A group who calls themselves MOWA (for Missouri and Iowa) led by Liz Sterling, Betsy Champ, and Bill Sterling, wish to reenact the Battle of Kirksville in April 2011 at a farm near Milan. They are meeting with the Missouri Civil War Re-enactors Association to gain their support and get on that schedule. From the information we have, this group has credibility and should do a good job with this project. The group needs a letter of support from the City saying that we are in support of them reenacting the Battle of Kirksville and highlighting our history, etc. They are meeting with the state group on Aug 21st and would like to take the letter with them. The group has only asked for a letter of support. The City Council should be aware that a reenactment inside the city limits of Kirksville is not possible. A draft letter of support will be presented on Monday evening for your consideration. A brochure of the Battle of Kirksville is included in this Newsletter.

### **KIRKSVILLE LEADERSHIP PROJECT**

The Kirksville Leadership Institute (KLI) is a program offered through the Chamber of Commerce to give individuals to the opportunity to learn more about the community, and hopefully spark their interest in getting involved in organizations, projects and events. Each year the group is asked to select a class project. Two years ago the project was banners for Baltimore. Last year's project was tree plantings at North Park. This year the group has chosen to make improvements at the Adair County Humane Society. The Society is housed on City property. The group wishes to have signs placed on Highway 6 either side of the shelter to let people know of its location. The group is also looking to place a gazebo on the grounds and make some landscaping improvements. There is an agreement that must be signed between the responsible party and MoDOT before the signs can be placed. The leadership group is asking the City to execute the agreement and agree to maintain the signs on Highway 6. This is a simple request and one that we will help support with the maintenance, and donation and installation of the signs. The signs are the standard informational MoDOT signs that you see along the roadway. We have the capability to complete the signs in-house.

## **HISTORIC PRESERVATION**

It is not every day that we have citizens call to volunteer their time, but we did have an individual who is relatively new to the community, who has expressed an interest in staying active and involved in historic preservation. Her interest and education lie with historic preservation and she had learned about our efforts. She will be volunteering her time to take the information we have on file on our historic properties and see if she can get it put on the computer on the State Historic Preservation forms, and then put on our web site. She may even do some original research on some of the properties. She is going to start on the properties that are on the National Register and that have been approved by the property owners. If she wishes to share her name at a later date, we will do that. We are also trying to determine whether or not to apply for a small grant from The National Trust of Historic Places. The grant is for \$25,000 and has to be awarded to a not for profit organization who has a mission of preservation. We are exploring options and possible projects.

## **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIC PLANNING**

A few individuals from our community have been contacted to participate as a Northeast Missouri representative to a regional economic development strategic initiative planning meeting hosted by Gov. Jay Nixon and the Missouri Department of Economic Development. This region is comprised of 20 counties. The meeting will be held at Truman State University on Wednesday, September 22<sup>nd</sup> from 9 am to noon in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Phil Tate Director Of Job Creation is one of only a few economic development professionals serving.

## **CEMETERY MARKER**

The City was contacted this past January by the Sons of Union Veterans of Republic, Missouri, to place a marker at the gravesite of James and Jane Sholley in the Forest-Llewellyn Cemetery. James was a Union soldier, and his wife, Jane, was a Union nurse. There were no markers on the graves. Notice was received this week that an upright granite marker will arrive in four to six weeks. They have offered to hold an appropriate ceremony, so we will let you know as soon as we receive any information. This is a great honor that a site in the Forest-Llewellyn Cemetery was chosen, and was approved by the National Department of Veterans Affairs.

## **ALTERNATE ROUTE UPDATE**

Route P intersection with the alternate route will probably remain closed until mid September. Then Route 11 crossing will be closed and is scheduled to be closed for 42 days. Patterson Street Crossing is under construction now and the street, (Patterson) is closed daily from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. for the work at least through the 16<sup>th</sup>, and then more time later, but he was not privy to that schedule.

## **STORMWATER REMINDER**

This is a reminder that the storm water fee will be placed on the August bill which will go out later this month. The following is information that Laura Guy has prepared for employees should they receive inquiries from the public. "In April 2010, the citizens of Kirksville voted to allow the City to incur debt through issuance of revenue bonds of

\$2.274 for storm water improvements. It was public knowledge that this debt was to be repaid through an estimated \$2.25 monthly storm water fee on all City utility customers. In June, the City issued these bonds to fund future storm water improvements. This project was actually started in July with Bartlett & West doing preliminary consulting and design work. Beginning with the utility bill to be sent out at the end of August, the new storm water fee of \$2.20 per month will be charged. This will be a monthly fee that has no sunset date.”

## **EARNINGS TAX**

Mayor Kuhns and I met with representatives from the organization Missouri Jobs for Justice. The topic of discussion was a petition that is being placed on the Missouri ballot concerning the repeal of the earnings tax. This meeting was arranged by Richard Sheets of the Missouri Municipal League. The League does not support this measure and felt it important for cities to know what was happening. There are only a few cities that actually have an earnings tax, St. Louis and Kansas City are two. Kirksville does not have an earnings tax, and it may appear that we should not care about this issue. But there are a couple of points that make it important that we as a community know what is happening. First, state statutes spell out what taxes cities can pursue and that method of pursuit is through the vote of the people, though we do not have an earnings tax today, should the community identify a project that could be funded through this source, this ballot measure if it passed would remove a tool from the tool box. The second issue is the manner in which this measure is being placed on the ballot. One individual has paid to get this accomplished using his personal resources. If he were successful with this tax what might he do with other taxes that we do have in place today that were voted on and supported by our citizens? The City Council is being asked to write a letter stating its position on this matter.

## **NEW BUSINESS**

A new business has opened up on Jane Way. C&R Transmission opened its doors on August 2. Cape Air has obtained its business license to begin its operation in September.

## **SURPLUS EQUIPMENT**

The City has a few items that we wish to surplus. The first are the pavers that were salvaged by the City from the downtown sidewalks. We are storing these and have no plans to reuse them in any sidewalk project. We also have several of the old lantern style street lights. With the completion of the computer replacement project, we have all of the computers that were removed from the workstations, along with a couple of servers. The last items are the bleachers that were pulled from all of the ball fields. We would like to offer city workers the opportunity to purchase a computer at a set price. Computerland gave us a value amount, and we are checking with the TCRC to see what they think. We have also been asked about donating one of the servers to a public entity in Novinger, and may find that they could use a computer or two. This may be of interest to the Council. The computers have all been wiped clean of data and software. The computers will though be sold with licensed software that the purchaser can install. We will be advertising these items for sale and asking for sealed bids.

## **RECOGNITION**

Kirksville was nominated for an award for excellence in downtown revitalization. Kirksville along with seven other communities was selected as finalists for this award. Each of the cities was presented with an award for this achievement on Thursday. The awards represent the hard work of many individuals who support downtown preservation. A representative of the Kirksville Downtown Improvement Committee was in attendance to receive the award. Kirksville is also being recognized by the US Census Bureau as one of several cities in the state of Missouri, who had successful Complete Count Committees. A representative from the US Census Bureau will be in Kirksville on Monday at 4:00 pm in the Council Chambers to recognize this effort. City Council members are encouraged to attend.

## **FARMERS MARKET**

Included in your Newsletter is a copy of the letter that was sent to Susan Fitzgerald, the Chair of the Kiwanis Farmers Market Committee. We will also be able to accommodate the Farmers Market request to install a sign at the theater parking lot. Our agreement with the theater owner gave the owner the right to use this space for a future sign. The Farmers Market received permission from the theater owner and the City will be installing their sign so that it is visible to people driving down Harrison or Elson.

## **CITIZEN SERVICE REQUEST**

Though the seeclickfix system was not ideal, city staff has been exploring other options to improve upon our current Citizen Service Request system. A button was placed on the City's home page to make it more visible, and that should help citizens find it easier. Another program has been identified, which does some of what the seeclickfix does as far as notifying citizens of the status of the projects, repairs, etc. Civic Plus a website company has a new [customer service request program](#). The program allows for an improved flow of information between the citizen and the City. The following link takes you to a presentation from Civic Plus that I found to be quite interesting and a possible consideration for us. [www.civicplus.com/requesttrackerdemo](http://www.civicplus.com/requesttrackerdemo). Included with this Newsletter are some pages from the website presentation. The cost of this program starts at \$49.95 per month. Staff has not spent time with any evaluation. If the City Council is interested we will explore this more. Council should be aware that Sarah Halstead, who maintains the current CSR system, has been reviewing this and has spoken to someone from the company and is very excited about some of the features that are offered.

## **NEW STUDENT ARRIVAL**

New students will be arriving to Kirksville very soon. An article was placed in the recent Kirksville Connection reminding citizens of this and giving the dates of the move-in. We are hoping this will help alleviate some of the congestion that occurs. Each year we send a letter to the new students welcoming them to Kirksville. Included with this Newsletter is a letter from Mayor Kuhns. This letter will be placed in a special edition of Truman Today and placed in the new students' dorm rooms. Also included with this Newsletter are dates from Truman State that show when potential students will be

visiting, and other important dates. If you have not seen them yet, Truman banners have been installed on Franklin Street from Normal to Jefferson.

## **AIR SERVICE**

Cape Air has been working to get everything in order. They have just informed us that you can purchase tickets for the air service on the American Airlines' website at [www.aa.com](http://www.aa.com). The American Airlines code was live and selling in Sabre for weeks, so their reservations center and travel agents could sell the tickets as American Airlines, not just Cape Air. Kirksville tickets are also being sold on Continental Airlines website at [www.continental.com](http://www.continental.com). There is a flyer included with this Newsletter that was developed by Cape Air and is being distributed. We have asked the County Commissioners for permission for Cape Air to place a thermometer on the courthouse property to promote the importance of the passenger count to make the air service sustainable. Also included with this Newsletter is a copy of the Air festival flyer.

## **WAYFINDING**

The Baltimore wayfinding signs are in place. If you have seen them, then you may have wondered about the size of the signs. The signs are the size allowed by MoDOT based on their statewide standards. They are more visible than previous signs. We are still in the process of getting the sign posts for the more decorative district signs and will have them installed in the next month or two.

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



**The Union Flag**  
The Union flag of the Civil War period had thirty-five stars in the field of blue with West Virginia being the thirty-fifth state.



**The Confederate Flag**  
The "stars and bars" was the first flag approved by the Confederate government. The flag flew from March 5, 1862 until May 26, 1863 before officials decided that when the wind was not blowing, the flag looked too much like the American flag "Stars and Stripes." So then the Confederate government adopted "the Stainless Banner," a pure white flag that had the red box with the blue X filled with stars. The box was the battle flag so the flag was just an altered version. The flag was flown from July 1, 1863 until a third flag was adopted on March 4, 1865 because officials thought that when the wind was not blowing, the flag looked too much like a white flag of surrender. The third flag, adopted in 1865, was the same as the second but with a thick red band running down the edge (right as seen above). The middle flag was adopted later.

## The Battle of Kirksville - August 6, 1862

Confederate Lieutenant Colonel Joseph C. Porter of Lewis County had been recruiting and harrying in Northeast Missouri throughout the summer of 1862. Adair County farmer Captain Mathias (Tice) Cain (Confederate), in command of irregulars from Schuyler County, sent word to Porter that he held Kirksville, then a village of 700 extending only a few blocks from the courthouse square. Their combined force was about 2000. Only about 500 were well equipped and took part in the battle; fully 1000 were unarmed, raw recruits. Porter arrived before noon on August 6.




Col. John McNeil

Colonel John McNeil (Union), Commander of the Northeast Division of the District of Missouri, had been following Porter since July 29. McNeil's forces were based in what is now Memorial Park. After unnerving the enemy with an artillery barrage, the Federals arrived on the edge of Kirksville about 10 a.m. The focal point of the battle was the courthouse square. McNeil sent in a squad who drew fire from the rebels concealed in the courthouse and the houses and shops around the square. The Confederates being discovered, the battle was joined, with Lieutenant Colonel Shaffer in charge of the Union right wing while Major Caldwell commanded the left. McNeil used about 500 of his 1250 soldiers in the battle.

As the two wings met and succeeded in driving the Confederates from the courthouse area, Porter yielded ground and concentrated his forces behind a fence on the western edge of town. From this position the Confederates poured withering fire into McNeil's men, who moved against the line and drove it to the west, while the left wing took full possession of the southern part of Kirksville. The battle lasted about three hours, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Many residents evacuated town before the battle, and only two civilians were killed. McNeil reported five of his troops killed and thirty-two wounded, against 150 Confederates killed, 300 to 400 wounded and forty-seven taken prisoner. A number of rebels were tried and executed for violation of parole on August 7 and 8. The day after the battle Colonel McNeil ordered Kirksville residents to bury the Confederate dead. The Battle of Kirksville is regarded as consolidating Union control of Missouri.



A rendering of William Parcell's Plantation. This was where the Union set up a base of operations and later burned their dead. The plantation, built before the Civil War, was reportedly damaged by cannon fire during the Battle of Kirksville. The Parcell Plantation is often confused with the Kellogg house, the site of which is nearby and both homes were at one time owned by the Kelloggs. Though the Parcell house was frame, whereas Kelloggs was brick, the door and window arrangement was similar. Finally, various mentions of a fenced-in causeway or walkway between the two homes led to further confusion.


