MEETING WITH PRESIDENT PAINO

The City Council will be meeting with Dr. Troy Paino on Monday afternoon at 4 pm in the second floor conference room. Once this meeting concludes the Council will receive a presentation from the Kirksville Housing Authority on the HeRO program and will then discuss the draft vicious animal ordinance.

SGT. MAGGART FUNERAL ARRANGMENTS

We know that the service for Sergeant Brandon Maggart will be held next week. What we are not sure is the date and time. The following information was provided to the Kirksville Police Department. "Visitation will occur at the Noe Funeral Home in Kirksville. The funeral service will be at the Kirksville Middle School followed with an escort to the Jacksonville Veterans Cemetery. Visitation, funeral, and escort to Jacksonville will be either Wednesday, 9/1/10, or Thursday, 9/2/10. The funeral service, escort to Jacksonville, and flag line for the committal service at Jacksonville will occur in the evening as the Kirksville Middle School will be holding school on those dates. The service at the Jacksonville Veterans Cemetery may take place as late as 9:00 p.m." Once we have the details, we inform the City Council. The Council should be aware that all City flags will fly at half staff for a seven day period starting with the date of the funeral.

WAYFINDING UPDATE

Engineering has confirmed the decorative posts have been ordered and are in route for delivery. Steel posts and tubes are being constructed by our local business, Midwest Machining. The steel post will be placed in the ground and the decorative post will be slipped over the steel post for better stability. The specs for the two posts have taken a great deal of time to finalize. Although what seems to be a very slow process, Engineering is working to make sure everything is done right the first time. The artwork and graphics have been finalized for the signs and the signs are being fabricated in house. Engineering is working with Todd Kuhns, Rotary Club representative on the kiosk directory map. The map is in the final stages of review and will be sent to the manufacturer for fabrication.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIC PLANNING

The Installation Planning Committee planning events for President Paino's installation as Truman's 16th President are planning multiple events the weekend of September 16, 17, and 18. The theme is "Celebrating Community" as President Paino would like to emphasize the importance of community. The Committee has determined that a great way to show the importance of unity collaboration is through community service. As a result, the Committee will be hosting a campus wide community service project on Saturday, September 18. All campus organizations, faculty and students are being encouraged to participate. The event commences at 1:30 (on Saturday September 18th) and concludes at 4:30 with a concert later in the evening at the Armory. The Committee is in search of projects or opportunities to do community service. If any member of the City Council has any project ideas, please let City Clerk Brumbaugh know, we will then submit the ideas to the appropriate Committee contact. Project ideas need to be submitted by Friday, September 10, 2010.

KDIC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

City staff met with KDIC President Kylene Puckett to review the process to allow the KDIC to find and hire a new director. The following advertisement will be placed in several publications along with the local newspaper, and on the City's website. Human

Resources Manager Pat Meredith will be working closely with the recruitment committee.

AED FUNDRAISING EVENT

On Saturday, November 6, The NEMO Heart Health, a newly formed not-for-profit corporation will be hosting the Gents and Joules event to raise funds to purchase automated external defibrillators (AED) devices they wish to place in various locations throughout the community. Several of those locations would be municipal buildings/properties. The goal of this organization is to improve the heart health of all citizens in Northeast Missouri through awareness and education. They plan to purchase the AEDs and maintain them. The City has a couple of representatives serving on the board. The word Joule in the event title is the measure of the shock that is delivered by the AED device. The question for the City Council is whether or not you would want to be a sponsor. Typically, this would not be something brought forward, however, since this organization's goal is to provide these devices throughout the community you may decide that a contribution is warranted. The sponsorships range from \$5,000 down to \$500. The sponsorship would provide seating and dinner for representatives in attendance. A suggested contribution might be \$1000, half the cost of an AED. A representative or two from the City Council could attend the event on the 6th if there was interest.

STORM DRAINAGE GRANT AWARD

The City of **Kirksville** has been approved for a \$300,000 CDBG. The grant will be utilized for a drainage system improvement project. We received official notification this week that the application submitted by the City was approved. This area was not one of the top priorities, but will receive grant money, along with local resources to make drainage improvements in the project includes the area between Hildreth, Boundary, and Dodson and First Street. The City will be asked to provide \$170,000 in in-kind support and \$50,000 in cash contribution. This grant award is good news to the City, and shows the efforts that are being made to maximum are available resources available for stormwater improvements.

NEW STUDENT WELCOME

The new student welcome for all new students to Kirksville will be Thursday, September 9 from 5 to 7 on the courthouse square. Local businesses and organizations will be there to provide information to the students. A free hotdog meal will be provided to new students. The City will be participating.

MISSOURI ENTERPRISE EFFICIENCY UPDATE

When the City Council met to discuss the Missouri Enterprise assessment proposals, a couple of you expressed little interest in the concept. But there were a few others that had some questions and wanted a response to those questions and were to send those to me. I had not received those yet. If I could receive any of the Council's questions in the very near future, I would appreciate it. This is a topic that I would like to have ready for discussion during your budget discussions.

SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

These words are being used more in our workplaces due to the increased use of network sites such as Facebook, Twitter, Blogs, etc. The City Clerk attended a session on this topic this summer, and learned that cities are being encouraged to create a Policy on social networking. Any communication on these sites regarding city business is considered a public record. These public records must be retained the same as any other record with the City, following the State Records Retention schedule. Interestingly, the Library of Congress is archiving every tweet – approximately 55 million a day. For government, unlike private employers, anything a worker does online may be considered a public record. That means any tweet, Facebook post or personal e-mail could be open to public scrutiny. Although the number of social media policies is limited right now, we will be looking at establishing a policy in the near future.

Still University Campuses with new students arriving and familiar faces returning to Kirksville to call it home while they learn.

This is an exciting time for all of these students, and an opportunity for us as a community to welcome them to Kirksville and help to make them part of our home.

Remember this is the first time that some of these students will have been away from home for an extended period of time. Not all of them have been exposed to the ways of the world and how to handle the details of their new independence. It's a learning process. As each of us move through our days, remember our new neighbors. Let's treat them with the same care and interest that we would want our own family members treated if they were new to a community.

FIRE CHIEF BEHRENS – WELCOME


Welcome back to Kirksville, Truman State University Students! Let's make your stay in Kirksville as fire safe as you and I can make it this school year. I would like to remind all of you returning students some safety tips.

For those of you living off campus, take a look at your apartment or house and become acquainted with it. This should involve looking at your escape routes, smoke detectors, and carbon monoxide detectors if required, and electrical panels. On the first night in a new apartment or house you might want to practice an emergency drill in the dark so you become aware of your new surroundings. Check that any detectors in your place by pushing the test button. Test the first day you move in, but also on a monthly basis. Know where the electrical panel is in your home so you can turn a breaker back on or off. If your apartment does not have enough outlets to plug everything in that you want, avoid using "octopus plugs" which allow many cords to be plugged into a single receptacle overloading it and causing a fire hazard. Unplug items that generate heat such as hair curlers, irons and hotplates.

For those students living in dorms, take a look at where the exits are in the hallway noting those you would normally use as well as those which you might not. Familiarize yourself with alternate routes of egress in the dorm and follow them so that they become familiar. Pay attention to fire alarms in your dorm and exit the building properly when the alarms are sounding.

For all of the returning students the following are suggestions to keep you fire safe: Extension cords are just temporary, and always check your cords for damage. Watch what you cook by not leaving items unattended. Avoid use of candles, but if you do use them, make sure they are in a noncombustible container that cannot be knocked over. Never leave the room with a candle burning, and make double-sure to blow the candle out before going to bed. If you smoke in your house, make sure that you have adequate ashtrays and that all cigarettes are out before dumping ashes into the trash can.

Some other tips are to buy renters insurance and put together an emergency pack that you can grab quickly to leave your apartment in event of an emergency. The emergency pack can include extra clothes, emergency phone numbers, medicines, toiletries, etc. This is just a short list of fire safety messages. For more information, come by the Fire Department and any one of the firefighters will gladly answer any questions you might have.

Tiny Tots Theatre Troupe

Children ages 3 to 5 will explore theatre through 5 basic elements: Voice, Movement, Props, Story and Concentration. A short play will be performed at the Halloween Carnival on October 30th at 2:30pm. Registration is \$20 and includes a t-shirt! Classes will meet Monday-Friday from 10am-10:45am at the YMCA from October 25th-29th. Register at the Aquatic Center before October 20th. There must be at least 5 students enrolled.

First Aid

Designed for persons with current CPR certification, this course trains responders to recognize and respond to an emergency and give care to help sustain life and minimize the consequences of injury or sudden illness until medical help arrives. Students should review the Before Giving Care and Checking an Ill or Injured Person sections of their CPR course prior to attending this class. The component course includes identifying and treating shock, stroke, diabetic emergencies, heat and cold related emergencies, poisoning and allergic reactions. In addition, you will learn to control bleeding, care for a muscle, bone or joint injury, and care for a head, neck or back injury. Students will receive a First Aid certificate valid for three years.

Stand Alone Full Course Cost: \$30
Adding to a CPR Course Cost: \$15
Recertification Course Cost:** \$10
Duration: 2.5 hours

Class Dates:

First Aid can be added to any CPR course that we offer or scheduled as a stand alone course with at least a weeks notice.

First Aid courses are also eligible for recertification by appointment.

Waterpark Lifeguarding

This course teaches the duties and responsibilities of lifeguards to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies and procedures to carry them out in a professional manner in regular pools and in waterparks. Certifies participant as an American Red Cross Waterpark Lifeguard. Includes certifications in CPR for the Professional Rescuer/AED, First Aid.

Full Course Cost: \$175
Recertification Course Cost: \$75
Duration: 37 hours

Course Notes: Minimum age of 15. Must swim 300 yards continuously using 100 yards of front crawl, 100 yards of breaststroke and 100 yards of either front crawl or breaststroke. Swim 20 yards, surface dive to a minimum depth of 7 feet, retrieve a 10 lb. object, return to surface and swim back to starting point with the object within one minute and forty seconds.





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
