NEMO RPC ANNUAL MEETING

The Regional Planning Commission will be hosting their annual spring membership meeting on April 25 at the new Knox County Community Center Banquet Hall in Edina. The dinner will start at 6 pm followed by the General Membership meeting at 6:30 pm. We would like to encourage members of the City Council to attend, if possible. Please let Vickie know by our Council meeting on April 16 if you would like to attend.

COUNCIL ATTENDANCE

City Councilmember Edge and Mayor Pro Tem Fajkus will not be able to attend the City Council meeting on Monday. Councilmember Edge will be out for a little while due to a knee injury. Mayor Pro Tem Fajkus will be out due to a work commitment.

LOSS OF SALES TAX REVENUE

A resident of Greene County filed a petition asking that the Missouri Supreme Court review the decision of the Department of Revenue denying his request for a refund of the local sales tax that this resident paid when he purchased a boat, outboard motor and trailer from Maryland and licensed it in Missouri. The Supreme Court of Missouri issued its opinion stating that the plain and ordinary meaning of the Sales Tax Law, sections 144.010 to 144.525, authorizes a county to impose sales taxes only on sales occurring within Missouri. This means that effective March 20, local sales tax will not be collected on purchases of motor vehicles, ATVs, boats, motors and trailers when these items are purchased out-of-state. Cities which enacted a local use tax, which there are 176 Missouri communities, will still be able to collect the revenue. This is an estimated loss of about \$57,000 to the General Fund, unless new legislation is enacted or the City of Kirksville pursues a local use tax.

BRUSH DROPOFF

As part of the trash service, the City has a roll off container at Public Works that is used by residents to dispose of leaves and grass clippings. Our agreement with Veolia provides for the disposal of 30 roll off containers each year. Any pull over 30, Veolia has the opportunity to bill us \$325 per pull. Veolia provided 36 pulls this past year and has informed us that they will be billing us the additional cost, approximately \$2,000. This is something that we will continue to track, as we may want to make changes to the yard waste system. Possibly relocate it to the City's property near the Adair County Humane Society to expand the hours or eliminate the service.

NORTH PARK SCULPTURE PROJECT

The City was contacted last fall by Brandon Crandall and the Freeman Foundation about the possibility of donating a piece of artwork for display at North Park. The Freeman Foundation is a local foundation that was developed by Travis Freeman, a Kirksville Rotarian. The foundation will pay for the development and installation of the artwork. The concept is of an adult tossing a baseball/playing catch with a young boy and girl. Some sketches are included in your newsletter. We would anticipate the process to take 1-2 years to complete and will keep you updated on the progress.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS EVENT

On Saturday, March 24, a comprehensive disaster preparedness event took place in Kirksville. The event was developed as part of a national effort, a local Disaster Awareness Response Team at A.T. Still University teamed up with local and state emergency management officials for a statewide disaster simulation drill. The event took place at the Kirksville RIII School Campus. There was good participation on the part of the citizens and the emergency service providers. ATSU became the Regional Training Center for the National Disaster Life Support Foundation to teach Disaster Life

Support courses for the American Medical Association. This designation will ensure that ensure that ATSU follows the mandate to train Kirksville's local responders. The planning process for next year has begun.

AT STILL FORGIVABLE LOAN

ON your agenda is action to allow the Council to loan \$100,000 to A. T. Still for the construction of a parking lot that will be part of the infrastructure needed to service the new dental school. The City Council pledged a forgivable loan to A. T. Still. The prepared documents provide this as long as the University creates both jobs and increases student enrollment. A. T. Still has asked if the Council would consider forgiving a percentage of the loan each year the University meets its obligation. Meaning after the first year, if the employee and student numbers meet the required levels, 20% of the loan would be forgiven. So, that it reduces their liability each year as opposed to having the \$100,000 note held over them for 5 years. This is not part of what is being presented in your agenda. The Council will need to discuss this and if you are agreeable with what is being asked, a motion amending the terms of the Agreement and Promissory Note will need to allow for the annual forgiveness of 20% of the loan.

KDIC UPDATE

From what we have been able to get from the KDCI Director, the KDIC may not be moving forward with pursuing a community improvement district. Since the KDIC has not a meeting this past month, we are only able to go with what he has told us. This news comes after the City Council worked to make sure that sufficient funding was in place to pay the salary of this position for both April and May.

SRF FUNDING

It appears that we will not be receiving SRF low interest loan funds this year as budgeted. Our project is the third project on the Fundable Contingency List. There are two projects ahead of ours, the first at a cost of \$24 million and the second at \$5 million.

ANNUAL AUDIT

Our auditors, Hochschild, Bloom and Company will begin working on our annual audit very soon. We are required to have the audit completed by June 30 each year. I have asked the auditors to complete the financial statements for this year and to work with Katie Myers, Finance Director to enhance her understanding of the preparation of these documents, preparing her for completing them next year.

NEW BUSINESS AND PARKING PLAN

A new building has been constructed at the corner of Novinger and Emmett that will provide a warehousing space for Frito Lay. The building entrances were constructed as designed. However, the time of service that this company will be accessing this property coincides with the heart of the use of the Pee Wee and Purple ball fields and patrons going to the ballpark park on the street. We are in the process of working this out. City staff will be meeting at the site to actual run a truck through the site to see how if there is any parking restrictions that will be needed to allow the trucks in and out.

CENVEO BUILDING INSPECTION

City staff is now in the process of conducting building inspections of the city owned industrial building occupied by Cenveo. After our recent inspection a list of corrections was identified. Codes and Planning Director, Brad Selby will be meeting with the plant manager to review the list and discuss a plan to eliminate the deficiencies. Also on a side note, the City is scheduled to make a presentation to MIRMA in May to plead our case regarding their denial of our coverage on this building.

SOUTH 63 PROJECT

MoDOT took bids on our South 63 sidewalk project. The bids came in at \$304,640 with W.L. Miller being the low bidder. The Missouri Highway and Transportation Commission approved the bid just last week. The bid is \$242,000 less than what was estimated. It will be a plain-jane project with sidewalk and some landscaping, but it will not have the pedestrian lights or enhanced landscaping that was originally presented by the developer. As a reminder, the City entered into an agreement with MoDOT on this project and will share the cost of the project. That means that both the City and MoDOT will share in the lower than estimated bid price. The City has a loan repayment agreement with the first payment due in December of this year. The project is expected to be completed this fall, at which time, MoDOT will determine the overall savings and adjust our repayment schedule. In relation to this, Mayor Pro Tem Fajkus sat in on a conference call with the owner of this shopping center to discuss how we move forward with the shopping center improvements. The owner stated that he thought he could paint the facades of the store fronts, but did not see based upon how much money he has spent in legal fees and other expenses, that the funds generated through the TIF and the CID would generate enough money for him to spend more. We are now going to go back and ask that he re-evaluate the revenue generation working with the City on what is being collected and determine if there is sufficient revenues to encourage more improvements.

OFFICE SUPPLIES

Included with this Newsletter is information on our annual purchase of office supplies and other items that you get typically from office supply companies. From 2008 to 2011 we spent \$66,000. One of the vendors that we have used is Staples. We used to have Staples store in Kirksville, I directed the person who makes these purchases to eliminate Staples from the list. My reasoning is that we have local vendors who chose to stay in Kirksville and should have the chance to try and get that business. I wanted you to be aware of this. We also have Golden Ruler who has a storefront on Baltimore, who in the past did not want to participate in submitting bids for our office supplies. Since we have three local vendors (Golden Ruler, Pro Tech and Wal-Mart) I would like to use these vendors for our office supply bids, with the exception of paper. We use a lot of paper and receive a significant deal from Quill on our paper.




