COUNCIL MEETING

As it stands, we have three members of the City Council who will be attending the meeting on Monday. Councilmember Edge is having surgery on Friday and Councilmember Mills will be out of town.

COUNCIL AGENDA

On Monday evening, there is an ordinance asking the Council to approve no parking on Emmett and Novinger Street. This is the area that is located by the North Park ball fields. The issue arose after the owner constructed a business and then realized that the business would have problems with ingress and egress due to people parking on both of these streets to attend ball games. In an effort to support business, we have put together no parking requirements that should eliminate the problems the business may have to get in and out of the property. However, since we are in the middle of ball season, we are asking that the effective date be June 15 as opposed to immediate. This will allow us the time to notify possible attendees to the baseball games.

FRANKLIN STREET DESIGN

As we have progressed with the Franklin Street Design work, Truman asked that we look into placing the power poles that run along Franklin on the west side of the campus from the former Randolph Street intersection to Normal. Ameren has provided the cost information, which is \$120,750. Truman is agreeable to pay this share of the project. An

agreement will be drafted and presented to both the City Council and President Paino stating that Truman agrees and that the City will complete additional improvements to Franklin.

EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION

The National Weather Service, beginning in June, through a partnership with FEMA's Integrated Public Alert and Warning System, officials will also be able to send warnings directly to cell phones. Using the new Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) system, the National Weather Service will send warnings for tornados, flash floods, blizzards and ice storms in the local area to cell towers that serve affected counties. The warnings will go automatically to many newer-model cell phones within range of the towers.

EMERGENCY STORM SHELTERS FOR MOBILE HOME PARKS

We have scheduled the Council Study Session for September 17 to discuss storm shelters and also to discuss trailer parks. This will give some time to the business that is working on establishing a shelter. It will also give us an opportunity to identify and make contact with area churches to find out if they would be interested in exploring this, as well.

PUBLIC WORKS RECOGNITION

On Thursday of this past week, Public Works celebrated National Public Works Week. As part of that celebration, a deserving employee is recognized and presented with the Granvil Prize Stevens Award. Granvil Prize Stevens was a former Kirksville Public Works employee. The award recognizes an individual who exemplifies strong positive work ethic characteristics. This year's recipient is Rodney Schoonover. Rodney is a former with the Street and Parks Maintenance Division and has been employed with the City since November 2004.

BALTIMORE SIDEWALKS

W.L. Miller was awarded the sidewalk project along Baltimore by MoDOT. This project will construct sidewalk on both sides of Baltimore from LaHarpe to the Shrine Club. Work began on the project on the 29th. The contractor has 77 days to complete this project

The City of Kirksville would like to thank MoDOT and the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission for the opportunity to comment on the 2013-2017 Statewide Transportation Improvement Program. The City has worked with the Transportation Advisory Committee of the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission to make our priorities known. We have worked as a part of the Highway 63 Transportation Corporation with MoDOT to make some of those priorities reality. We are pleased to see our near term priorities for Kirksville and Adair County reflected in the 2013-2015 STIP, even though they are typically listed in the 2014-2015 Fiscal Year.

We are concerned that the long range priority for this region, improvement of US Highway 63 from Kirksville to the Iowa line, is not even mentioned in the plan. We believe that the improvement of Highway 63 from Kirksville to Iowa should at least be included in the Scoping and Design Projects in the later years of the proposed STIP. The absence of this vital project from the STIP may lead to a loss of the momentum gathered during the completion of the four-laneing of Highway 63 from Macon to Kirksville and the construction of the alternate Highway 63 project, and a waning of vital public support.

SATURDAY HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION EVENTS

(Kirksville, MO) -- The City's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) site is currently accepting appointments for disposal of HHW on Saturday, June 9, and Saturday June 23, from 9 am to noon. Citizens may call the Public Works Complex at 627-1291 to schedule their appointments. Scheduled drop off appointments ensure that qualified staff is available to assist citizens with their disposal of eligible items. The program is limited to household waste and does not include disposal of any commercial hazardous waste. This facility is housed at the Public Works Complex, located at 2001 N. Osteopathy.

Household Hazardous Waste is a broad term that applies to any leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients. Items that will be accepted at the Kirksville collection site include: Aerosols, Antifreeze, Batteries-nicad, Batteries-alkaline, Batteries-lead acid, Batteries-lithium, Batteries-button, Ballasts, Bulbs-fluorescent, Bulbs-shattershield, Bulbs-HID, Bulbs-U-Shaped, Bulbs-crushed/broken, Cleaners-water based, Cleaners-ammonia-based, Corrosives, Cylinder-fire extinguishers, Fertilizers, Oil-cooking, Oil-used filters, Oil-motor, gear, lube, Paint-latex, Paint-oil-based, Paint-lead based, Pesticides/Poison-Pesticides, Herbicides, Insecticides, Rodenticides, Miticides, and Fungicides.

New emergency alert system can deliver warnings directly to cell phones

Emergency management officials know that in weather emergencies, such as tornados, warnings can save lives. But they can't always rely on traditional warning methods — television, radio and outdoor sirens — to reach everyone. Beginning in June, through a partnership with FEMA's Integrated Public Alert and Warning System, officials will also be able to send warnings directly to cell phones.

Using the new Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) system, the National Weather Service will send warnings for tornados, flash floods, blizzards and ice storms in the local area to cell towers that serve affected counties. The warnings will go automatically to many newer-model cell phones within range of the towers.

"While these warnings may look like text messages, there won't be any charges on your phone bill," said Randy Behrens; Emergency Manager City of Kirksville. "This is just one more way to be alert for imminent dangers, whether you're at home or on the road."

The short messages will provide very basic information, such as the type of warning, affected areas and duration. "When you get this warning message, we encourage you to turn to other sources for more detailed information about what to expect and what actions you should take," said Behrens.

Whether and how you'll receive the alerts depends on your cell phone and service provider. About 10 percent of the cell phones in use today are already capable of

receiving the alerts; others, such as newer iPhones and Android models, will soon receive software updates that add this feature. The wireless industry estimates that by 2014 nearly all phones on the market will be WEA-capable.

The alerts are delivered directly from cell tower to cell phone through a one-way broadcast. The system will not track or locate individual cell phones or phone numbers — it simply broadcasts to all phones within range. Unfortunately, in some cases, this may result in over warning.

“For example, if we issue a warning for Adair County, Missouri, it will go to all towers that serve that county. If you live in an adjacent area, such as western Knox County located immediately east of Adair county, you may get the warning, too,” said Andy Bailey, warning coordination meteorologist at the National Weather Service office in Pleasant Hill. “Towers in urban areas generally serve a radius of two to five miles, and in rural areas up to 10 miles, so the warning message may reach a little beyond the warning boundaries.”

The alerts will include a unique ring tone and vibration. They will not interrupt any phone calls or downloads in progress. If you’re on the phone when the warning is issued, you’ll get the message after you end your call.

In addition to weather alerts, the system can broadcast AMBER alerts and presidential alerts for national emergencies. On newer phones, these alerts will be turned on by default. Procedures for opting out of the alerts will vary by carrier.

“Like any new system, we’ll no doubt have some issues to work through,” said Behrens. “We hope people will be patient and not opt out of these potentially life-saving messages. The system will get better with time, but it’s too important to wait any longer.”
