CITY SPONSORED EVENTS AGENDA ITEM

As efforts continue to work on the events for the Battle of Kirksville Anniversary, an issue came up with what is allowed in our parks. We have specific ordinances that do not allow for the “removal of dirt for fire pits” (sec19-4), “use of fire for cooking” (sec 19-5), “use of firearms (sec 19-6)”, and “no camping” (sec. 19-15). In order to have the reenactment event we need to allow for some of these things under the supervision of our Parks and Recreation Director (Assistant City Manager Melanie Smith). We have placed two items on the agenda. The first is an ordinance that would allow the Council to vote to allow the Director some leeway for City sponsored events. The second item would then be the actual vote allowing her the discretion needed to complete the reenactment events. The previously reported grave markers for two Civil War soldiers have been installed. Pictures of the markers are included in this Newsletter. Following these pictures is a panel that will be completed and displayed at a city location. We are

waiting on the receipt of an agreement from the State of Missouri to present to the City Council.

NEMO FAIR CEREMONIES

The Northeast Missouri Fair will begin next week. Opening ceremonies will take place on Monday morning at 8 am at the flag pole. Council Members interested in attending may do so. The Fair runs from July 16 through the 21st. City services and support are provided to the Fair Association throughout the week.

PARK SIGNS

Included with this Newsletter is a proof of a sign that has been approved by LPRC for Memorial Park. A similar sign has also been approved for PC Mills Park. We hope to have similar signs like these placed in all of our City parks.

LETTER TO VEOLIA FUEL SURCHARGE

Included with your packet is a letter that Finance Director Katie Myers has sent to Veolia concerning the fuel surcharge. Veolia first gave us notice in February of the need to charge customers a fuel surcharge. The first surcharge was assessed beginning in April. We had communicated to Veolia that our contract requires they submit the request by the 10th of the month at the start of the calendar quarter. We received a request to raise the fuel surcharge on the 11th of June. The letter states that we will not be changing the fuel surcharge. In addition, there has been confusion as to the calculation. Veolia gave us a flat amount and has now revised it to a percentage. We are working this out with them.

JEFFERSON STREET LAYOUT

City workers will begin making lane changes on Jefferson Street from Baltimore to High Street during the week of July 16th. Jefferson Street will be restriped from four narrow lanes to a three lane section consisting of a center turn lane with one lane of traffic and a bike lane in each direction from Baltimore Street to High Street. The layout will be very similar to the three lane sections of Baltimore. This change will eliminate conflicts from vehicles in what is now the left hand lane turning across the path of those in the right lane, and should make the road easier to navigate for all citizens. The crews will

begin laying out the new pattern on Monday, and should complete painting of the main lane dividers by Thursday, July 19th. Painting will be done in the early morning hours, to minimize disruption to motorists.

LION'S CLUB

Representatives of the Lions Club International (Abilene, Texas) were in the office this week with the announcement that they have started a drive in Kirksville to sign up a Lions Club. Years ago there was a Club located here. They have already signed up a few from the community, and they are hopeful to have city government officials on board. The Council and City Manager are invited to attend an informative meeting at Colton's Steak House on Thursday, July 19, at 7:00 p.m. There is a one-time signup fee of \$30 with dues of \$6 to \$8 per month, payable monthly or annually. RECOGNITION FOR FIRST BOOK

The City of Kirksville was recently notified that the First Book – Truman State University program is celebrating their five-year anniversary. This program is certainly deserving of being recognized for the enthusiasm and dedication toward breaking down the number one barrier to literacy by access to books. The program has supported children throughout our community through partnerships with the Kirksville Day Care Center, Preferred Family Healthcare, Head Start Centers and the TSU Speech and Hearing Clinic. The program provided low income children at least one book per month at no cost. Mayor Detweiler sent a letter of thanks and congratulations to First Book for five years of success.

CITIZEN CONCERN

The Council may recall receiving a complaint from a citizen concerning a perpetual garage sale at the corner of Normal Avenue and Baltimore. At least a year if not more ago, the owner of this property and I had discussed his intentions to have garage sales at this location, he also owns a second hand shop in town, and we discussed separating the business from this property because he was not licensed at the Normal location. I had the occasion to speak to him again when he asked me to look at a problem he had with another piece of property he owns on Harrison. This issue concerned his belief that the City's street was encroaching on his property. He had had a survey completed recently and the survey showed our Harrison Street within his property line. I researched this matter and spoke with City Attorney Hickman about the issue. We have no issue with the street and that needs to be communicated to Mr. Hamidi. When I met with Mr. Hamidi at his property he showed me a weed problem that he had on his property as a result of his neighbor storing business materials (Kirksville Plumbing) onto Mr. Hamidi's property. He had received a letter to remove the weeds and was agreeable to do so. He stopped in this past week and believes there is more to the garage sale and weeds issues and may be at the Council meeting to express his concerns with the Council. Mr. Hamidi had two issues, a perpetual yard sale at 615 E. Jefferson, City staff had spoken to this property owner prior to Mr. Hamidi complaining, and weeds allowed on his neighbor's property. Mr. Pulis was told to remove the weeds.

The difference was Mr. Pulis was verbally told by City staff and Mr. Hamidi received a letter as a result of a complaint from the City's Citizen Service Tracker system.

BUYING LOCAL

There are two programs out there encouraging the support of local business. The first one is the 3/50 Project. This is one that KTVO has supported and promoted for some time. The idea is to pick three businesses that you would miss if they were no longer here and make an effort to spend \$50 each month at that business. The second is Independent We Stand. Independent We Stand is a group of independent business owners across the country that work to inform their communities about the importance of "Buying Local" and how these efforts bolster their local economy. This movement supports all local and national causes committed to boosting local economic development projects. In checking out their website, we have several Kirksville businesses that are participating. Both of these are aimed at supporting the local business which in turn helps us to do what we need to serve the citizens. Would the Council like to discuss this in more detail at a Study Session?

TRUMAN REQUEST

Truman State University is interested in placing more banners around their campus. The area of interest is along Normal Avenue between Franklin and Davis. They will be purchasing 11 Truman banners and hanging them on the city-owned power poles along Normal.

PERSONNEL UPDATE

Sara Holzmeier , Police Corporal accepted a position with Probation and Parole, Mike Robinson, Firefighter II/EMT has accepted a position with Adair County Ambulance and Ken Scott, Firefighter II/EMT will be activated for a least a year beginning in October. We have two full-time vacancies in the E911 Center. Ryan Rusk part-time employee was offered full-time employment to fill a vacancy in the Street Department after Adam Songer began indefinite Military Leave.

INSURANCE UPDATE

The first six months of 2012 has been a good six months for insurance claims. Currently we have paid \$268,511 for medical and dental claims and \$57,568 for prescription drugs. If this trend continues we could finish the year spending less than 50% of the amount budgeted for claims.

MEETING UPDATES

KREDI met this past week and discussed changes to its website. They also reviewed a revised membership dues structure that outlines the benefits of a KREDI membership. The Board is gearing up for a membership drive. There will be a familiarization tour for the Missouri Partnership later in the month. The Tourism Board met and approved marketing funds for the upcoming Red Barn Arts and Crafts Festival. Tourism Director Boughton reviewed the schedule of events for the upcoming Civil War Traveling Exhibit which will be in Kirksville from July 22 through September 4 at the Kirksville Arts Center.



THE BATTLE OF KIRKSVILLE



A STATE DIVIDED: THE CIVIL WAR IN MISSOURI

On Aug. 6, 1862, Col. Joseph C. Porter and 2,500 confederate recruits occupied Kirksville, Mo., and prepared to fight a pursuing force of 1,000 Federal cavalry led by Col. John McNeil. For a month Porter had rampaged across northeast Missouri, enlisting men and disrupting Federal operations. Porter decided to occupy a strong position in a town, bloody his pursuers as they attacked and then slip away as the Federals were recovering. He had originally selected Memphis, Mo., but when he learned some of his men held Kirksville, he headed there instead.

Preparations for Battle

Porter arrived in Kirksville early on August 6th. Though his force outnumbered the Federal troops, most were inexperienced and less than half were armed. Porter left his horses and unarmed men in the woods west of town. He concealed an advanced line in buildings and cornfields along the north and east sides of town and placed his main body in ambush behind a rail fence, two blocks west of the courthouse.



The Federal troops, under Col. McNeil, commander of the District of Northern Missouri, reached Kirksville from the Northeast around 10 A.M. McNeil's force was disciplined, well-armed and supported by five pieces of artillery. Many of his men had not eaten in two days and their horses were worn from the pursuit, but the men were eager to fight now that Porter was within grasp.

McNeil set up his headquarters at the Cumberland Academy where he ordered his men to set up the artillery, a 12-pounder mountain howitzer, a pair of 2-pounder steel rifles and two field guns of the 3rd Indiana Battery. Half of his troops were to attack on foot, while the rest served as a reserve and guarded the horses and wagons. Lt. Col. William Shaffer commanded a battalion of the 2nd Missouri Cavalry


(Merrill's Horse) and detachments of the 2nd and 11th Missouri State Militia (MSM) which formed the right wing of the attack. East of town, Maj. Henry Caldwell led the left wing, consisting of detachments of the 3rd Iowa Cavalry and the 1st State Militia Cavalry.

The Fight for the Town

In order to locate the Southerners, Lt. John Cowdrey and a squad of about eight men galloped toward the square hoping to draw fire. "I regretted to see him called out to execute this perilous order," recalled Capt. George Rowell, a friend of Cowdrey. "Not a shot was fired until the little squad arrived at the second street, when from each side the fusillade [barrage] commenced and it is safe to say there were at least 100 shots fired at this little band." Five of the squad were wounded, two of them mortally.

With Porter's men located, the Union artillery opened fire. The heavy barrage caused Porter's raw recruits to panic and many abandoned their positions. Union Maj. John F. Benjamin witnessed the effects, "Our fire, and the effective discharges of grape and shell from the Indiana battery, soon made the place too hot for the rebels, and they 'vamoused the ranch' in the most approved style. . . . Many were brought down in their attempt to escape?"

The Federals rushed the first line of buildings. On the right, troopers of the 11th MSM seized two houses and fired on confederates hiding in the cornfield. The surprised



southerners threw down their weapons and ran. Others offered stiffer resistance. A detachment of Merrill's Horse assaulted a house where confederate R. K. Phillipps was stationed, "Merrill's men formed in front and charged, but double-barreled shotguns are an ugly thing to charge on. They made three charges but were forced to fall back."

As the outer line of houses fell, the confederates retired into the town. The Union artillery advanced while McNeil's two wings converged and seized the courthouse. The Confederate main line opened fire from the rail fence to the west, but the Federal right wing drove it into the brush. Porter ordered a retreat, and his men rushed to their horses. Elements of the 11th MSM chased them through the brush, capturing prisoners, horses, guns and equipment. The southerners streamed west to the Chariton River. The retreat descended into chaos as the road narrowed at the bridge and the crowded men pushed in fear. A detachment of Merrill's Horse tried to follow, but their horses were too exhausted.

Aftermath

After three hours of fighting, dead and dying littered the streets of Kirksville. Approximately 100 Confederates were killed and 300 wounded, many of them having been hit as they retreated. Federal casualties numbered five dead and 32 wounded. One civilian, Elizabeth Coups, was killed when she was caught in a crossfire. Two Federal surgeons and a local doctor treated the wounded for 60 hours without

stopping. "I visited two of the churches," recalled Assistant Surgeon John W. Trader, "and their wounded filled the body of the church, with all the pews taken out; they were lying on the floor on straw as thick as sardines in a box." Forty-seven unwounded Southerners were captured, but most were released on parole after swearing not to fight again on pain of death. Fifteen, who had been paroled before, were executed for violating their previous oaths. They and the other confederate dead were buried in mass graves in and around the town cemetery.

Porter's Campaign in Northeast Missouri


In April 1862, Confederate Maj. Gen. Thomas C. Hindman sent Col. Joseph C. Porter, a prominent farmer from Lewis County, Mo., to operate behind Federal lines in northeast Missouri. Porter was to raise recruits, harass the federals and return with his men to Arkansas. He organized a network of spies, couriers, and recruiters and by early July was ready to strike. He captured Memphis, Mo., on July 13, revealing his presence to the federals, who were soon scouring the countryside for him.

During the next two weeks Porter's band rode more than 500 miles — recruiting, fighting, and capturing arms and equipment. Soon his force had grown to nearly 300 men. Porter took his men into Callaway County to cross the Missouri River, but he was defeated at Moore's Mill on July 28 and was forced to turn back.

Porter headed north, closely pursued by Federal cavalry under Col. John McNeil. The Southerners captured Paris, Newark, and Canton, Mo., then halted in northwestern Lewis County around August 3. By then Porter's command numbered more than 2,000, thanks to his successes and to a recent Federal order drafting all men into the Union militia. Many who had thus far remained neutral joined Porter rather than fight for the North.

His success was tempered when the Confederate loss at Kirksville resulted in the disbandment of his army. Porter kept about 300-400 recruits and set up camp not far from his Lewis County home. In mid-September, Porter led his men to Palmyra, Mo., where they captured, and later killed, a pro-Union citizen. The next month, on Oct. 18, 1862, 10 Confederate prisoners were executed at Palmyra's fairgrounds in retaliation for the murder.

The Palmyra Massacre was a grim ending to Porter's 1862 raid in northeast Missouri. Porter was mortally wounded on Jan. 11, 1863, at the Battle of Hartsville, Mo., and died a month later.

Dear Ms. Burnam,

I received an email from you on July 11, 2012, titled "Kirksville July 2012 Payment Form" that was sent at 10:45am. According to the terms of the contract, the request for the fuel surcharge must be submitted to the City by the tenth of the month. Due to the lateness of the email, I respectively, decline the payment form.

In your letter dated April 5, 2012, you referenced a spreadsheet tool would be used to calculate the fuel surcharge. This same spreadsheet tool, known as the payment form, was included in the July 11th email. This spreadsheet is not a satisfactory form to use as a request for a fuel surcharge. Back in April, you requested \$0.63 per unit, 5.8%, but this form calculated \$0.65 or 6%. In the future, I need a letter or an email that specifically requests a percentage, for example, 6.1%. The percent needs to agree to the payment form calculation.

The current fuel surcharge of \$0.63 per unit (\$0.52 per senior citizen unit) or 5.8% that was requested in April will remain for the months of July – September. The next opportunity to request a fuel surcharge will be October 2012. Please submit your request no later than October 10, 2012.


