ELECTION DAY

Please remember to vote on April 2! In addition to having two City Council seats up for election, the Wastewater Bond issue will also be on the ballot. The savings in interest for the bond financing over traditional lease purchase is estimated at over \$3 million over the 20 year life of the bonds, so the issue will be very important to the City's budget in years to come.

SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING

After the April 2 election, the City Council will need to have a Special Meeting on Monday April 8. I would like to suggest that you have that meeting at 4 pm if that is possible. The purpose for the meeting will be to certify the election results, swear in the elected candidates, than organize the leadership of the City Council. Council members take their seat on the Council on the first Monday following the election.

EASTER EGG HUNT

The Kirksville Parks and Recreation Department and the Women of Cardinal Key are hosting their **Annual Children's Easter Egg Hunt** on Saturday, March 30. Children and their families are invited to bring their baskets and join the Easter Bunny at the hunt. The Easter Egg Hunt will begin promptly at 10:00 am and will be held on the Truman State University Quad. This is a FREE event!

MoDOT LISTENING POST

The Missouri General Assembly has recently proposed \$8 billion in new funding for MoDOT and Missouri transportation. It is vital the Missouri citizens get involved and let MoDOT know what projects should be built with this new funding--especially including much-needed bicycle and pedestrian projects. MoDOT will be in Kirksville Wednesday, April 3rd at Truman State University in the Student Union starting at 4 pm. This is one of the last listening sessions in this region of Missouri, and MoDOT is inviting folks from the entire north-central and northeast parts of Missouri to attend. NEMO RPC TAC

Today, the City received a letter from our Regional Planning Commission outlining the process that the RPC will follow in their effort to provide feedback to MoDOT regarding priority projects for our region. The City has one representative on this Committee, currently Mayor Detweiler. After the election in April and when the Council determines committee assignments, the council representative who receives this responsibility needs to attend the quarterly meetings and insure Kirksville and Adair County are represented. In addition, the RPC is asking for input on the 2012 list of identified projects for our region of the State. This list will be presented to ATC on Tuesday for input. A copy of which is attached for your review. The letter outlines the process that

the Commission will handle each year to provide input to the Missouri Department of Transportation on transportation needs in our area of the state.

PARKS AND RECREATION TO GET NEW CONCESSION EQUIPMENT

The members of the Parks and Recreation department attended the Annual Food Showcase sponsored by Kohl's whole sale and were the winners of a \$1,000 door prize. This prize will be used to purchase new equipment for the concession stands for the summer season.

ROYALS BASEBALL TO AIR ON CHANNEL 3

The City is partnering again with Cable One to air the Kansas City Royals on Cable Channel 3, the City's public announcement channel for the 2013 season. The schedule is included in this newsletter packet. The games will not air on the following dates, due to already scheduled airing of the City Council Meetings: April 6 & 19, May 10 and September 20.

FRIENDS OF FOREST LLEWELLYN CEMETERY

The first meeting of the Friends of Forest Llewellyn Cemetery was held today. After introductions and a review of its purpose members discussed potential projects and ideas. The first project will be an Arbor Day Celebration where the City will plant trees along the main roadway of the cemetery. Members of the City Council and community members are invited to attend. The event will take place on Friday, April 26 at about 3 pm.

BLOOD DRIVE SCHEDULED IN HONOR OF DAVID HALL

A blood drive has been scheduled on Wednesday, May 22, from Noon – 6:00 p.m., at the NEMO Fair Grounds Multi-purpose Building in honor of David Hall, the Kirksville Regional Airport Director. As you know, David was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia in February, 2013. The leukemia stemmed from a chronic blood cancer, Myelofibrosis, that he was diagnosed with four years ago. The event is sponsored by City of Kirksville, Cape Air, Kirksville Masonic Lodge #105 & Adair Lodge #366. An ambitious goal has been set of 150 usable units for this blood drive in Honor of David. To achieve this we will need to have at least 195 people present, so please tell your family and friends. The event is being coordinated by the City's wellness committee. GROSS RECEIPTS FEES

The City ordinance Chapter 14 – Licenses, Permits and Miscellaneous Regulations, Article II – Businesses, Occupations, Professions or Services was reviewed last year by the City Council. During the review process, the Finance Director determined that Gross Receipt Fees authorized under section 14.19 – 14.22 were not submitted by all businesses. The practice of the Finance Department was to send a Gross Receipt Fee form on a quarterly basis to businesses with a sales tax identification number. This practice failed to send forms to businesses that do not collect sales taxes, but are

required to pay a Gross Receipts Fee. There are 242 businesses that have not been receiving a Gross Receipts Fee form that will be getting a form starting with the 1st quarter of 2013. The Finance Department plans to send a letter with the 2013 first quarter form to explain the fee and how it is calculated. A business that collects less than \$30,000 in a year will not have a fee. A business that collects more than \$30,000 in a year will pay \$.50 for every \$1,000 over the \$30,000 minimum. A business that collects \$100,000 in a year will pay a total of \$35. Gross Receipts Fees are only on receipts collected from Kirksville. If a business is located in Kirksville then all of their receipts are subject to the fee. If a business is located outside of Kirksville and they have receipts from other non-Kirksville business then the fee only applies to the Kirksville receipts. The impact on the businesses will depend on the amount of their receipts. The fiscal impact to the City will be dependent on the receipts of the businesses and the cost of the additional mailings.

PSEUDOEPHEDRINE RESTRICTIONS

Members of the City Council may have met with Sheriff Hardwick and asked to consider establishing an ordinance that would ban the sale of pseudoephedrine products over the counter. This product is used in the manufacture of methamphetamine. There are a few cities in the state of Missouri that have enacted an ordinance banning the sale. Included is an article from when the City of Ellisville approved the ban. There is also an article from the Attorney General in Oklahoma stating that cities in that state cannot implement such an ordinance. This is included just as a reminder that as a city we have rights based on what is expressly allowed by Statute. Meaning if the Council was interested in pursuing such an ordinance, we would need to make sure that there is authority to do so.

PERSONNEL UPDATE

Tim Cuculich and Daniel Ferguson were promoted to Foreman in the Water Distribution division and Bruce Darr and Mark White were promoted to Equipment Operator. Ryan Rusk and Allen Busch transferred to the Water Distribution Division leaving two vacancies in Street /Park Maintenance. We have interviewed six people for the two vacancies and are currently in the process of background investigations. We hired Aaron Followwill to fill our last vacancy in the Police Department and Melissa Hocker was hired to fill the Accounts Payable Clerk position in the Finance Department. Applications are currently being accepted for seasonal positions. Two employees are currently on extended Family and Medical Leave of Absence.

INSURANCE/WELLNESS

We would like the City Council to consider adding a "Smart Test" to our 2014 health assessments; it would be a one-time test at the time of the health assessment. The A1c test for diabetes is more accurate test than the Glucose test. The cost would be \$25 per individual that receives the test. Only those employees that meet the following three criteria would be tested:

1. Fasting Blood Glucose greater than or equal to 100
2. If the member has Metabolic Syndrome

3. If the member self-reports that they are diabetic

PREMIUM DIFFERENTIAL

The City Council has asked employees to take an active role in their health (participating in Health Assessments) and health care cost by paying 20% of the employee only premium. Wellness program regulations under HIPAA allowed employers to reward employees for participation in a health-contingent wellness program by offering a discount not greater than 20%. Beginning in 2014, HIPAA will allow a 30% differential. Currently, an employee who did not meet their goal in January 2013 pays \$88.56 per month for (employee only) medical insurance. If the City Council elects to increase the differential the employee share could increase to \$132.52 per month if they do not meet their IHS goal in 2014. For those employees who chose not to participate in the 2013 health assessments (approximately 28) their non participation may delay their eligibility for the discount until 2015.

Here are some facts to support the importance of workplace wellness programs:

- Most American companies' costs have increased 38% over the last four year
- 70% of all health care costs are the direct result of behavior.
- 74% of all costs are confined to four chronic conditions (cardiovascular disease, cancer, diabetes and obesity).
- 80% of cardiovascular disease and diabetes cases are preventable.
- 60% of cancers are preventable.
- More than 90% of obesity is preventable.
- Personal responsibility and financial incentives pave the path to a healthier America.

While an increased premium may have a positive impact on employees' participation in the wellness program; reducing health care costs, reducing absenteeism and worker's compensation losses any increase will be a financial burden to those employees who do not participate or have difficulty meeting their goal. If City Council wishes to proceed with the 30% premium differential we should notify employees of our intentions to increase the employee's portion of the employee-only premium in 2014 so they can increase their efforts to meet their 2013 IHS goal. The weight loss challenge, walking activity, and wellness presentations will conclude the first week of April.

SMOKING

The City Council asked about the costs of smoking. Below are some statistics that Phil Drescher sent to me.

- The CDC estimates that the economic costs of smoking are \$3,391 per smoker per year in direct medical costs and lost productivity. The estimated breakdown is like this: \$1,623 in excess medical expenditures,

plus \$1,760 in lost productivity per year, plus \$8 in smoking-attributable neonatal expenditures.

- Studies show that a tobacco user's annual medical costs are on average \$1,700 higher than the costs of a non-tobacco user
- For every pack of cigarettes sold in Indiana, Hoosiers spend \$7.57 in health care costs related to smoking.

Proposed HIPAA regulations may allow employers to differentiate premiums up to 50% for smoking status (tobacco use) in 2014. The employees cost for employee only insurance would be approximately \$221.42 per month or \$2,657.04 annually, provided we do not experience a premium increase in 2014. This may have to be adjusted slightly to ensure that we do not exceed guidelines under the Affordable Health Care Act. Tracking employee's smoking status would be a difficult provision to monitor. How long nicotine stays in your blood rests on the fact that it gets transformed into a metabolite called cotinine which mixes in the blood and affects the body. The liver slowly detoxifies the body by removing the toxins from the blood whereas the kidney flushes out the waste products out of the body in the form of urine and stool which takes place at a much faster pace. Blood tests can detect even the slightest traces of nicotine in the bloodstream and would cost an extra \$30 per employee. If the second provision regarding smokers passes, I believe we would need to offer smoking cessation classes for employees who wish to quit smoking.

STATE AVIATION DAY APRIL 9, 2013

State Aviation Trust Fund Overview

History:

- The State Aviation Trust Fund was established in 1998.
- Revenue for this program is generated from a sales tax on jet fuel sold in the state.
- The fund was last extended through legislation in 2012 and will remain in place through 2023.
- Grants can be issued for up to 90% state trust funds with a 10% local match.

Purpose:


- The State Aviation Trust Fund is an important economic development tool. It supports a state airport system that contributes approximately 150,000 jobs and \$9.5 billion in economic activity to the statewide economy.
- The Trust Fund program has been very successful and is supported by the aviation community.
- The funds are used to maintain and develop the state airport system and can be used at 110 public use airports.
- Funding for this program has gone toward the construction and maintenance of runways, taxiways, aprons, the installation or repair of safety equipment and navigational aids, engineering and technical studies and acquiring land for improvements.
- Funding from this program has also gone toward safety initiatives such as fire fighting training, emergency response training for aircraft incidents, air traffic control services and safety programs such as taxiway reflectors.
- The funding also allows commercial service airports to pursue new airline service for their communities.

Legislative Initiatives

- Thank legislators for their work last year in extending the expiration date of the State Aviation Trust Fund, passing legislation that requires safety markings on certain anemometer towers and modifying the law that governs liens on aircraft.
- Oppose any legislation that eliminates a provision of law that allows taxpayers leasing commercial property at certain publicly-owned airports to decrease the value of the lease for real estate property tax assessment purposes by the cost of any new construction or improvements to the property.
- Seek support for future legislative issues that could include: updates to the state's air service program and changes in eligibility requirements for airport business and strategic planning; extension of the sunset date for the sales tax exemption for aircraft parts; and flyaway exemption legislation, which would allow a non-resident aircraft buyer to complete the purchase without paying Missouri state sales or use taxes.

RE: Improved Transportation "Needs" Prioritization Process

Dear TAC Member:

In an effort to improve the Transportation "Needs" Prioritization Process, discussions have taken place between MoDOT Staff and RPC staff. While our TAC members have done a very good job at identifying needs in the past, improving the description of the need, spending more time evaluating the need, and assigning numeric values to high, medium and low needs should provide a better end product.

Instead of just utilizing one of the four yearly TAC Meetings to discuss needs, it has been decided that each of the quarterly meetings could be used to more fully identify and analyze what has been identified by members as a need.

What is being proposed is the following:

1st Quarterly Meeting – Members submit needs one week prior to the meeting. Each need should contain the following information.

- Submitting agency or customer
- Location – as specific as necessary to identify the need, i.e. Bridge on Route X in This County over Some Creek, 1.2 miles west of A Town.
- Issue or Concern - a description of the problem or concern that we would like to address.
- Possible Solutions (optional) - any thoughts on potential solutions that would solve the issue.

A. In the meeting the needs may be briefly discussed to see if there is any need for clarification.

2nd Quarterly Meeting – Between the 1st and 2nd quarterly meeting, RPC and MoDOT Staff will prepare formal Data Sheets for each need. This sheet will include the information that the TAC member provided as well as technical details related to traffic counts, accident rates, bridge ratings, etc. Also, a map and photos will be included. At the meeting, each representative will have the chance to present their need and answer questions from other members on their need. At the meeting, each member will receive a



packet of needs. Having this in hand will allow each member to study the needs and if necessary or desired, have the chance to drive the actual site before the following meeting.

3rd Quarterly Meeting – At this meeting, the voting will take place. Each TAC member will be allowed to distribute their votes in an even manner as far as the number of highs, mediums and lows. A numeric value will be given high, medium and low so that rankings can be determined.

4th Quarterly Meeting – Results from the voting will be presented. Also, results from the other two RPCs in the Northeast District will be presented so that a clear picture of the entire district can be seen.

By moving in this direction, it is felt that each member will have a better understanding of the other county needs and have a chance to give individual ratings that are true to that member's judgment of the importance of each need.

Please feel free to refer back to the attached 2012 final "needs list" and add or delete any need, as you see fit. Please have these back to me by April 12, 2013 so I can forward them on to our MoDOT office.

ELLISVILLE BANS PSEUDOEPHEDRINE (effective date July 2011)

Effective next month, pseudoephedrine won't be available in Ellisville as an over-the-counter drug following a vote by council members Wednesday meant to curb the manufacture of meth.

The city council voted 4 to 3 in favor of the ban, which means residents seeking the nasal decongestant will have to use a doctor's prescription to get it, or acquire it in another city.

The vote Wednesday night means Ellisville joins the ranks of Eureka, Wildwood and other nearby cities trying to fight the production of methamphetamine, a highly addictive illegal drug that law enforcement officers say requires pseudoephedrine as a key ingredient. Ballwin, too, [recently considered a ban](#) on over-the-counter sales of the drug.

Mayor Matt Pirrello said he sympathized with some council members' desire to avoid interfering with civil liberties, and said the issue would be more effectively addressed by state lawmakers. Similar proposals at the state level stalled in the capitol's most recent legislative session, however.

"The question then becomes what do we do in the interim," Pirrello said.

Multiple law enforcement representatives addressed the council prior to the vote Wednesday. Special Agent James Shroba, an Ellisville resident and member of the Drug Enforcement Agency, told council members the ban was necessary in part due to shortcomings of a statewide pseudoephedrine tracking system. As of September, consumers in Missouri buying pseudoephedrine are required to present an ID in order to limit how many boxes one individual can purchase in a month. That practice leads to groups of people going on pseudoephedrine collection junkets, Shroba said, oftentimes with compensation up to \$80 a box for individuals with a usable, unmarked ID.

"These people are all career criminals," Shroba said. "They work from east to west and west to east and stop at every pharmacy, Dierberg's ... any place with a pharmacy, and they fill up that trunk with pseudoephedrine pills."

Coincidentally, Ellisville Police Chief Tom Felgate said police investigated an incident Wednesday afternoon wherein two individuals at Walgreens on Manchester Road near Hudson Avenue bought pseudoephedrine with fake identification. The two people then went to the parking lot and returned shortly after to attempt to buy more. Police were later called, but the individuals were not located.

"This is exactly what we're trying to combat by getting this bill passed," Felgate said.

Council Member Michelle Murray said she isn't advocating for a state law against the over-the-counter sales, but called cities' bans "trendy" and questioned why a widespread issue is being attacked at the local levels.

"If it's such a chronic problem, then all we're doing is suddenly kicking it over to another community," Murray said. "I can't stand it that we live in a place in society where we ... (punish) citizens who are law abiding, good members of our community. They're not doing anything wrong, yet they're the ones who are going to be inconvenienced by this."

Council members Troy Pieper, Roze Acup, Pirrello and Linda Reel voted in favor of the proposal. Council members Murray, Dawn Anglin and Clark Compton voted against it.

Attorney General's office says cities have no authority to ban pseudoephedrine

Oklahoma Attorney General Scott Pruitt says recently enacted city ordinances aimed at stopping the meth epidemic are invalid.

In an opinion released Friday afternoon, the Attorney General's office said cities do not have the power to regulate the sale of pseudoephedrine, which is a key ingredient in meth.

Pruitt says that only the state can enact such a law.

Okmulgee, McAlester, Chouteau, Holdenville and Wagoner have all adopted ordinances that require a prescription for the tablet form of Pseudoephedrine.
