MML REGIONAL MEETING

The Missouri Municipal League Regional meeting will be on Tuesday, December 3, 2013 at A.J.'s Eat and Drink, 1407 North Missouri Street in Macon. Registration and social hour is scheduled at 6 pm with a prime rib dinner at 7 pm. The registration fee for the meeting (including the dinner) will be \$20 per person (tax and gratuity included). Stuart Haynes of MML will talk about the [top 10 things elected officials need to know to avoid trouble](#). Council members should find the topic helpful, so please let Vickie know if you are available to attend. Councilmember Moritz plans to attend.

ANNUAL EMPLOYEE MEETING

City offices will be closed from 1 to 3 pm on Wednesday, December 4 to allow employees to meet and learn about changes to their employee benefits. The Finance

Department will be closed from noon to 3 pm, which means that citizens will not be able to make payments during those hours on that day. On a related matter, Phil Drescher with Bukaty Company, our benefits consultant, will be at either the January or February Study Session. He will want to present the year end numbers to the Council and will need to wait for those numbers.

ORDINANCE CHANGES

The City Council discussed a couple of ordinance changes, one of those concerned the utility billing due dates if the due date falls on a Saturday, Sunday or holiday. This will be presented to the Council on January 6, the same date as the public hearing on the utility rates. This will be in time for those payments due on January 20, which happens to be a holiday.

BUSINESS LICENSE

We have been reviewing information provided to us by our local hotel operators and businesses and realized that there is no information provided by either that would let us know how they are calculating their fees. Finance Director Fuller and staff are trying to determine the best way to gather this information, whether it is meeting with the businesses and reviewing information at their sites or requiring additional paperwork to be submitted, or a combination of the two. Our brief review shows that other cities require the information to be submitted and do conduct audits. Also, before we send out the business licenses, the Council discussed whether or not you wanted to change the license fees for storage units. What I heard from the Council was that you did not, but wanted to make sure before we sent out the license renewals.

AFFORDABLE HEALTH CARE PROGRAM

Policy Analyst, Thomas McAuliffe (Missouri Foundation for Health) has agreed to meet with our community again on Friday, December 13th from 10 am – Noon. Mr. Thomas has been asked to specifically address what employers are expected to do by Jan 1st, as compared to what was originally slated for implementation several months ago. Because of the delays and changes to the original time line for implementation, it would be good to know what has changed, if anything, and how that impacts employers. Due to limited seating, if you would like to attend let Vickie know and she can RSVP by phone to the Career Center staff at 660-785-2400. Reservations must be received by Friday, December 6th.

STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICE

On November 22, 2013 the City received notification from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, State Historic Preservation Office that two properties (nominations) in the City of Kirksville: 1) Drs. George and Blanche Laughlin House, 706 Halliburton Street and 2) Sojourners Club, 211 South Elson Street were recommended for approval. The nominations will be forwarded to the National Register for the final administrative process.

KIRKSVILLE REGIONAL AIRPORT

Kirksville Regional Airport was recognized in the Missouri Statewide Airports Economic Impact Study. The study was conducted by the Missouri Department of Transportation. The study reviewed and measured the direct, indirect and total economic impacts of the state's nine commercial and 99 public-use airports make on Missouri's economy. Kirksville Regional Airport's total economic impacts in 2012 were \$6,139,000.

ADVANCED DISPOSAL

Advanced Disposal would like to thank the City of Kirksville for their business and wishes us all a wonderful Thanksgiving Holiday. Advanced Disposal will be closed on Thursday, November 28th in observance of Thanksgiving. Customers with collections on Thursday or Friday will fall one day behind schedule this week.

TRI-STATE DEVELOPMENT SUMMIT

November 21, 2013 the USDA Rural Development State Directors from Illinois, Missouri and Iowa announced the designation of the Tri-State Development Summit as a Great Region. USDA supports rural communities that work together on a multi-county or regional approach to creating economic opportunity and job creation. The Tri-State Development Summit works to accomplish the task of assessing regional needs and identifying resources to meet those needs.

MISSOURI HEALTH FOUNDATION GRANT

The City closed out and provided a Final Status Report to the Missouri Foundation for Health. The Healthy and Active Communities Grant in the amount of \$295,727 provided repaving and restriping for 15,750' of existing bike lanes, added 2750' of new bike lanes, signage for designated bike lanes were purchased with installation to be completed in 2014 and the City has drafted a Complete Streets Policy.

COUNCIL FILING

The terms as Councilmember will be up in April for Roger Edge and Jerry Mills. Filing at the City Clerk's office in City Hall will open at 8:00 a.m. on December 17, 2013, and will close at 5:00 p.m. on January 21, 2014. These three-year term positions will be voted on at the upcoming April 8th General Municipal election.



We want to take a moment to inform you of an upcoming adjustment to Cable ONE's cable television rate structure.

Effective with the January 2014 billing period, our video rate will increase by \$5 per month. Current customers who are on a promotional rate are excluded from this increase during the term of their promotion. Customers will be notified of this change in their December 2013 billing notice.
