JESSE KIRK DEDICATION CEREMONY

This Sunday, May 18, at 2:00 pm, the Friends of the Forest-Llewellyn Cemetery Committee, invited guests, and community members will gather at the gravesite of Jesse Kirk, for whom Kirksville was named, on May 18, 1842. Through donations from the City, County, and a penny drive of the Kirksville R-III School District third graders, a new stone was purchased and will be dedicated on Sunday. Mayor Moritz and Commissioner Carson Adams will unveil the new stone, followed by a history of Jesse Kirk and the recognition of others who have given time to the improvement of the

Cemetery. On Monday, May 19, at 3:30 pm. Mayor Moritz will present the original Jesse Kirk stone to the Adair County Historical Society at the Adair County Museum located at 211 S. Elson St. in Kirksville.

DAVID HALL MEMORIAL BLOOD DRIVE

This Wednesday, May 21, from 12 pm to 6 pm at the NEMO Fairgrounds, the American Red Cross is hosting the David Hall Memorial Blood Drive in memory of former Kirksville Airport Director David Hall. The event has been organized by Hall's family in conjunction with the City of Kirksville. The NEMO Fairgrounds are located at 2700 E. Illinois St. in Kirksville.

REGIONAL PLANNING MEETING

On April 30, Glen Moritz and Mari Macomber attended the NEMO Regional Planning Commission (RPC) meeting in Edina. Each office of the RPC gave a report on their work. The Solid Waste Management District reported that they had rejected all grant applications submitted. The City had submitted an application for glass recycling. The reject was due in large part to conflicting language found in the grant application. The District wanted to correct the language and is expected to request new submittals. The summary ranking of transportation needs completed by the Transportation Advisory Commission (TAC), which includes Harriet Beard, Stan Pickens and Mari Macomber for Adair County, was distributed. The results are attached. Some of the projects, like the airport, did not rank as high as we had hoped. The majority of TAC members are interested in resurfacing the roadways and not in total transportation needs.

On May 5, Chris Chung, the President and CEO of the Missouri Partnership, gave a presentation on economic development during the City Council's Study Session. KIRKSVILLE ARTS ASSOCIATION CELEBRATES ANNIVERSARY

On Friday, May 9 at 3:30 pm, the Kirksville Arts Association held a celebration at the Kirksville Arts Center to celebrate the one year anniversary of the Legacy Mural, located on the West-facing façade of their facility located at 117 S. Franklin St. The community was invited to participate. The event was followed by an opening reception for "Images in the Abstract" by Colleen Wagner.

CITY OF KIRKSVILLE 401A PLAN

The City has been working with Tammy Morper of Retirement Plan Advisors who is willing to assist the City's tax attorney in retroactively amending the City's 401a plan. Morper has stated that fiduciary responsibility rests with the City of Kirksville, however, Retirement Plan Advisors incorrectly advised the City in 2005 when the City stopped contributing to the 401a plan. The City Council will be asked to approve future amendments to this plan.

HEALTH INSURANCE STATISTICS THROUGH APRIL 2014

For the first four months of the calendar year, the City's claim's experience is 43% of what was expected for this same period. The City has only spent \$207,725 (\$141,765 in medical claims, and \$65,959.93 in dental claims) \$272,411 less than the expected \$480,136 that was budgeted for health insurance claims for the period of January through April. Though this is good news, there is always potential for additional claims. The Finance Department believes the City is still on course to meet the budgeted amount for 2014. Nonetheless, this is good news.

DOWNTOWN TRAFFIC SIGNALS

On April 14, a large truck hit and tore down the City's overhead line connecting the traffic signals and caused damage to the roof of a private structure. An Incident Report was filed. This particular line connected the "flash" phase of the traffic signals between the master controller and the slave controllers. Two traffic signals continue to flash between 6 pm and 6 am, and they are located at the intersections of Franklin and Jefferson and Elson and Jefferson. The other four traffic signals were connected via the overhead line that was torn down and they now only work in 'normal' operation 24 hours a day. With the signals working in normal operation, there is no safety issue to contend with, so no immediate action was required. The Public Works Director has directed Public Works staff to not replace the overhead line until the Council makes a final decision on the entire traffic signal proposal. The cost of the repair is estimated to be between \$4K and \$8K. If the Council decides to maintain the traffic signals, the Public Works Department will replace the overhead line.

MCKINNEY BARK PARK RULES AND MPR'S RESPONSE

The Dog Park Committee has compiled a draft set of rules for the upcoming McKinney Bark Park. These rules were sent to the City's insurance provider, Midwest Public Risk. Please see MPR's response to the draft set of rules attached to this Newsletter.

KIRLIN'S HALLMARK OPPORTUNITY

The Economic Development and Community Services Department is attempting to connect any person or persons interested in purchasing the inventory of Kirlin's Hallmark and maintaining a Hallmark store in the Downtown with both Kirlin's Hallmark and the Hallmark Cards Company. JUNIOR VARSITY TIGER SUMMER BASEBALL

Tiger Baseball parent Paul Stuart has volunteered to maintain the Junior Varsity Tiger Summer Baseball schedule after the program was cancelled by outgoing Kirksville R-III baseball coach Andy Jackson. The previously agreed to fee structure with the City will be maintained. The Varsity Tiger Summer Baseball schedule remains cancelled.

ATSU REVOLVING LOAN FUND

The City entered into a revolving loan fund agreement with A. T. Still University of Health Sciences (ATSU) on April 18, 2012 and loaned \$100K as a means of demonstrating municipal support for the institution's new Missouri Osteopathic School of

Dental and Oral Health (MOSDOH). Please see both the agreement attached to this Newsletter as well as a letter from ATSU demonstrating they have met the requirements of the agreement with the new MOSDOH.

WARNING SIREN REPORT AT FIVE YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF 2009 TORNADO

TAXI CAB COMPLAINT

Over the last year, several members of City staff have received anonymous letters from an individual who believes taxi service is being offered without a license. The Police Department has investigated these complaints regarding a taxi cab purportedly operating without a license in the area of Village 76. They have found no evidence that this is occurring. Both citizens purportedly involved have been questioned and maintain they are not operating a taxi cab service. The activity appears to involve one family member driving another family member to and from locations, which does not require a license per Municipal Code. Council is being informed of this in the event anonymous letters are sent to Council members.

AQUATIC CENTER FLOOR INSTALLATION

The installation of a new floor in the Aquatic Center was completed by Technicote on Saturday, April 26 and the Aquatic Center reopened on Wednesday, April 30. The appearance of the Aquatic Center floor has greatly improved, but initially there were complaints regarding the slickness of the floor. Technicote returned on Friday, May 9 to use an industrial scrubber on the floor to reduce the slickness of the surface. This scrubbing significantly reduced the slickness of the floor. Facilities and Aquatic Center staff will continue to take appropriate steps to address the slickness of the floor, if necessary.

AQUATIC CENTER FRONT DESK

Due to existing damage to the front desk at the Aquatic Center, as well as the installation of the new Aquatic Center floor, it is necessary to replace the front desk prior to the opening of the outdoor pool over Memorial Day weekend. The project to replace the front desk at the Aquatic Center is currently underway. Dog Parks

Background

Dog parks present unique hazards and exposures for Member entities. This advisory's approach is to provide general guidelines each Member entity can use to customize the most appropriate policies, procedures, and signage relating to a dog park.

It is the goal of MPR that each Member entity will take all measures appropriate to ensure that their dog parks are safe and pleasant environments for all its users, both canine and human.

The American Kennel Club has [additional information and resources](#) your entity may find interesting and of value, and includes success stories and other opportunities a dog park can bring to your community.

Special Consideration for Smaller Children

The presence of young children in dog parks are of particular concern, and certain limitations that are commonly imposed at individual homes also make good sense at dog parks.

Children are guests at the dog parks. For their safety and health, certain limitations should exist specific to their presence and activities within the confines of dog parks.

Natural canine behavior, particularly in groups, poses certain inherent risks to the health and safety of smaller children. For that reason, the presence of children under the age of 14 is discouraged under any circumstances.

If children under the age of 14 are permitted to enter the dog park, they must be accompanied and properly supervised by an adult or guardian age 18 or older. Additionally, at least one adult to supervise the child(ren) and one adult to supervise the dog(s) of each family or household visiting the dog park should be present in order to assure the safe interaction of all users of the facility.

Recommended Rules and Regulations

Rules and regulations for dog parks should be displayed on a large, permanent sign affixed to the fence or immediately posted outside the fence of the dog park, adjacent to each entrance gate.

The sign should post emergency and general business contact information, which will allow users and guests to report incidents, and to report equipment and facility damage or maintenance issues.

1. Users of the dog park do so at their own risk. City/County/Park Board shall not be liable for any injury or damage caused by any dog in the dog park.
2. All park gates must remain closed at all times other than during entry and/or exit; only one gate shall be open at any one time, and then only to enter or exit the dog park.
3. The dog park area is for dogs, their handlers and those accompanying them. No other use is allowed.
4. All dogs must be legally licensed and vaccinated, and shall wear visible tags on a collar at all times, and shall be leashed until inside the dog park.

5. Dogs under 4 months of age and female dogs in heat are prohibited.
6. Dogs must be under the control of and within view of their owner/handler at all times.
7. Spike collars are prohibited.
8. Children 8 years and under are not allowed in the dog park; children ages 9 to 15 years must be accompanied by an adult.
9. Handlers must be 16 years of age or older.
10. Handler is limited to a maximum of three dogs and must have one leash in hand for each dog under their control.
11. Handlers clean up after their dogs, removing and disposing of pet waste and filling any holes dug by dogs under their control.
12. Smoking, alcoholic beverages, food, and any glass containers are not permitted in the dog park. Training treats for dogs are permitted.
13. Dogs must be leashed and removed from the dog park at the first sign of aggression or mounting behavior.
14. Dogs with communicable diseases or open sores or wounds are not permitted in the dog park.
15. No animals other than dogs shall be permitted in the dog park.
16. Owners/handlers are responsible for any injuries caused by the dog(s) under their control.
17. Vegetation and wild animals in the dog park may be harmful to dogs.
18. Any bite of a person or other dog must be immediately reported to City/County/Park Board/Animal Control and the persons and dogs involved must wait for an officer to respond, except in the case where immediate medical care is needed.
19. The dog park is closed when City/County/Park Board personnel are conducting maintenance.

If your entity is thinking about establishing a dog park or a dog run, following are points to consider that should promote safety and limit liability.

- There should be adequate fences that dogs cannot dig under or jump over.
- There should be adequate parking so that dog owners/handlers can drive to the dog park and park their cars, as opposed to walking large numbers of dogs on nearby streets, and taking up parking spaces required by the residents.
- There should be at least one gate that securely latches. Consider using two gates, so that a dog rushing through the first cannot get past the second.
- Visible signs should establish rules and regulations and provide emergency contact information.
- Use available communication sources to encourage new dog park users to first visit the park without their dog to become oriented to the layout.
- Encourage all users to survey dog park activities upon arrival before bringing their dog into the park; they can check for aggressive behavior of other dogs and courtesy of other users.
- Strongly consider a "small dog" area, segregated by appropriate fencing from the "large dog" area. Separate signage indicating size or weight for the "small dog" area is appropriate.
- Provide waste bags and trash receptacles, which allow users to gather and dispose of pet waste in a sanitary manner.
- Consider "Adopt-a-Bench," "Adopt-a-Bag" or other sponsorship opportunities to add amenities for users, without increasing operational or maintenance costs.
- Conduct a regular review of use, complaints or reports of incidents, and maintenance records to determine if changes are needed.

AGREEMENT

This Agreement entered into this ____ day of April, 2012, by and between the City of Kirksville, Missouri, hereinafter referred to as the "City" and A. T. Still University of Health Sciences, a Missouri nonprofit corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "University".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the University is desirous that the City continue to assist the University with the costs incurred by the University in connection with the development and construction of a Dental School to be located in Kirksville, Missouri; and

WHEREAS, the City is desirous of assisting the University in such fashion in order to increase the number of full time employees within the City and to enhance the quality of healthcare within the City;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The City shall loan the University the sum of \$100,000.00 under the City's Revolving Loan Fund, with said loan to be evidenced by a promissory note in a form acceptable to the City. The loan proceeds shall be used by the University in the construction of necessary parking facilities for said Dental School.

2. The terms of said loan shall be as follows:

- a. The principal amount shall bear interest at the rate of 1.083% per annum.
- b. Principal and interest shall both be due and payable in one lump sum on or before the 31st day of December, 2018.

3. In the event that the University shall have created, on average prior to the maturity date of said promissory note, a minimum of ten (10) new full time jobs and 35 new students at said Dental School, then the City agrees to forgive the principal and interest due under said promissory note, and the same shall be considered as having been fully satisfied by the University. A full time job shall be defined as one in which the employee works an average of 35 or more hours per week, at an average wage which is greater than or equal to \$12.21 per hour (the current average wage for Adair County, Missouri).

4. The University shall provide written documentation to the City on an annual basis of the number of employees employed at said Dental School, including job titles and annual compensation (excluding benefits). Said written documentation shall be provided annually to the City's Assistant City Manager commencing on or before May 15, 2014,

and on the same date each year thereafter until the maturity date of said promissory note.

5. In the event either party shall breach the terms of this Agreement then the nonbreaching party shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorney's fees incurred in enforcing this Agreement.

In Witness Whereof, the parties hereto have executed this Agreement the day and year first written above.


In accordance with the Revolving Loan Fund agreement dated April 18, 2012 between A.T. Still University of Health Sciences ("ATSU") and the City of Kirksville, please find enclosed the following documentation that ATSU has fulfilled the May 15, 2014 loan forgiveness requirements.

- As of April 30, 2014, ATSU has 17 full-time employees for support of the Missouri School of Dentistry & Oral Health ("MOSDOH"), with an average wage significantly greater than \$12.21 per hour (the average wage for Adair County in 2012). See the attached list of employees and corresponding job titles.
- In the fall 2013, MOSDOH matriculated 42 students for the Class of 2017. See the attached list of students.

Please let me know if this correspondence satisfies the first year requirements of this loan agreement. For audit purposes, could you please send an acknowledgement of the 20% loan principal forgiveness (\$20,000) and indicate the amount of interest forgiven.





There were 40 total needs identified by the TAC. A ranking of High, Medium, or Low was given to each need. In order to have a near equal number of each, 15 needs were assigned High, 15 needs were assigned Medium and 10 needs were assigned Low. This was completed at the 4/23/2014 TAC meeting.
