FOUNDERS DAY EVENT

As last discussed in the April 29, 2015 Council Newsletter, the Friends of Forest Llewellyn Cemetery Committee have planned to hold another Founders Day Event with a dedication ceremony on May 17, 2015 at 2 pm when the John H. McNeil Camp No. 62, Sons of Union Veterans, will honor five Civil War veterans whose stones will be set this weekend. Family members in-state and out of state have been notified and will be in attendance. The Council is encouraged to attend. Please contact City Clerk Vickie Brumbaugh if you will be in attendance.

FIRST ANNUAL KDIC KIRKSVILLE CRITERIUM RACE

The Kirksville Downtown Improvement Committee met for their May, 2015 meeting on Tuesday, May 12, at 6 pm in the DuKum Inn. One item of interest on their agenda was the First Annual Criterium (Crit) Bicycle Race being held Saturday, May 30, from 8 am to 12 pm, with registration in the parking lot at Stokes Stadium at Truman State University. This is the first event of its kind in Kirksville, and the race is registered with USA Cycling. The KDIC is currently working on ways to incentivize the riders and spectators to come to Downtown Kirksville and benefit the economy of the Downtown area.

25 BEST COMMUTER CITIES IN MISSOURI

Kirksville has made the top 25 best commuter cities in Missouri according to a report by The Obrella Insider. Kirksville made the list at #2 with an average commute time of 13.1 minutes. According to The Obrella Inside: "The average American's commute to work is about 25 minutes. But residents of the best commuter cities in Missouri only spend 16 minutes getting to and from work, and 65 percent commute for less than 15 minutes. Besides being inconvenient, long commutes can impact our lives in a number of ways. For example, long commutes can result in higher auto insurance premiums and affect overall health. On the other hand, people can benefit from short commutes and we want

to recognize the 25 best commuter cities in Missouri for bringing these benefits to their residents.”

MODOT AIR SERVICE MARKETING GRANT

The Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) has signed the Air Service Agreement with the City. It was fully executed on April 21, 2015, so the City is free to begin incurring costs as part of the Air Service Marketing Grant as of that date and can begin sending in requests for reimbursement at any time. The City will update the Council as we begin to see results from the Air Service Marketing Grant.

ROOF REPAIRS TO CITY STRUCTURES

As last discussed in the April 29, 2015 Council Newsletter, roof repairs to the Lambert Building will begin as soon as they weather is agreeable to the contractors to begin their work. The City will update the Council as work progresses. Regarding the roof of the building housing the Cenveo Corporation, there are only a few pieces of cap left to complete as part of the project. The roof was as bad as the contractors expected and the work is time-consuming. The contractors have a couple of “intersection” patches to apply and then cleanup will begin. Please see photographs of the work attached to this Newsletter. The City will update the Council as work progresses.

BRIGHT BEGINNINGS DAYCARE REQUEST

Last year the City worked with Bright Beginnings Daycare, who was losing their day care space due to the sale of the building they were renting. The City worked with the owner, Jill Scheurer and ATSU to ready a space in the city-owned Lambert building. After moving in to the space, there were a number of heavy rains that resulted in damage to the day care site, leading the City and ATSU to partner together on necessary repairs to the roof. The agreement between the City and Bright Beginnings calls for an increase of \$100 in the monthly rent, which is currently \$500. Mr. Scheurer has asked if the City would consider holding off on the increase and allow the \$500 fee to remain for another year. The day care did incur additional costs after moving in due to the condition of the roof. Unless the Council objects it is my plan to hold off on the increase for this year.

HB 389 CONCERNS

The City has concerns over a recent piece of legislation in the Missouri General Assembly, HB 389. Finance Director Lacy King wrote the following to our State Senator, Brian Munzlinger: “Dear Senator Munzlinger, My name is Lacy A. King and I am the Finance Director for the City of Kirksville. HB 389 is of great concern to our municipality. After reading through the bill, my first great concern, besides the fact the Missouri Department of Revenue (MDOR) should not be a pass-thru entity for local municipalities, is the ability of MDOR to meet the requirements of this bill. The probability of payments actually being remitted to the local municipalities 15 days after receipt by MDOR is very questionable. Currently, it takes two months to process other types of taxes that are collected by MDOR and passed through to the local municipalities. Many municipalities run on a very constricted cash flow. Depending on the time of year and outflows required, lag in the timing of these payments for smaller communities could mean the difference in meeting payroll, utilities and basic operating

supplies. In addition, if there is an error in the allocation of payment, it will take several weeks to resolve the issue between MDOR and the utility companies as well as numerous calls or letters. This complication could actually impact public safety in smaller communities without cash reserves. Another concern would be the fees lost from the revenues of a municipality. I assume the fee would be assessed to the municipalities by keeping 1% before remitting any payments to them. For 2014, these fees based on four categories of franchise fees collected by the City of Kirksville in 2014 would cost us approximately \$16,783. As mentioned, this is only four utilities, not other taxes or fees collected. Translated to the impact incurred by the City would be more than ½ of a full time employee's salary, one less patrol car per year, approximately 672 feet of water or sewer line repairs or replacement, 900 feet of roadway repair, other City services including the support of the annual baseball and softball programs, small business support and the sidewalk replacement program. This administrative cost of 1%, I fear, would need to be increased as the businesses served increase from 25 the first year until an unlimited number. In addition, would the communication between all entities now be routed through MDOR? As City boundaries change, who would be responsible for communicating this to business remitting payment to MDOR? Can we insure these changes will be accommodated and served. Since those businesses now charge the end consumer the municipal taxes as a pass through and then MDOR will take those payments as another pass through to the municipalities, who will protect the fees being charged to the consumer? As citizens move in and out of communities, who will keep those lines of communication open? Currently, some entities send a list of addresses to verify the correct fees or send paperwork to prove the taxes owed. As I stated earlier, I have many concerns for HB 389 and its impact on municipalities. Please consider voting no on this legislation."

The latest update from the Missouri Municipal League (MML) regarding HB 389 stated the following: "[HB 389](#), requiring the Department of Revenue to collect the municipal taxes and utility fees for certain businesses, was scaled back in committee to just include the collection of municipal taxes by DOR. However, the committee substitute bill was not reported to the President Pro Tem for floor debate.

The language in [SB 115](#) that mirrored provisions in [HB 389](#) was taken out by the House and Senate Conference committee, who had been tasked to work out differences between the House and the Senate.

Although we were successful in stopping or removing these harmful bills we do expect attempts during the final week of the session to add these detrimental measures onto bills that are moving through the legislative process. We will be watching for these attempts."

WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE

The City's insurance company, Midwest Public Risk (MPR), submitted workers compensation insurance rates for 2015 at \$114,473.07 over budget. This amount is preliminary based on last year's rates for each department. Wage fluctuations will have an impact. The Finance Department is working towards an insurance bid for 2016-2017, however, due to the large worker's compensation claims recently, it will have an

impact on any potential bidders. We may be in a situation that other find us too much of a risk. Please see the letter from MPR attached to this Newsletter. Department managers have been instructed to identify areas where they can cut their budgets to cover the additional costs to their budgets.

PROPERTY & LIABILITY CONTRIBUTION INDICATIONS

The City's insurance company, MPR, submitted property and liability contribution indications for July 1, 2015, at roughly \$80,000 over budget. Please see the letter from MPR attached to this Newsletter. Again, we are looking at ways to minimize this impact to the budget.

WAREHOUSE 660 PARTNERSHIP

The City and the owners of Warehouse 660 have been working on boosting usage at the Aquatic Center. It has been proposed that everyone who starts a new membership at Warehouse 660 will be given a 10 punch pass to the Aquatic Center, and everyone who buys a pass at the Aquatic Center will be given a free month at Warehouse 660. It is anticipated that by giving Warehouse 660 members a taste of the Aquatic Center that they will want to also purchase memberships at our facility.

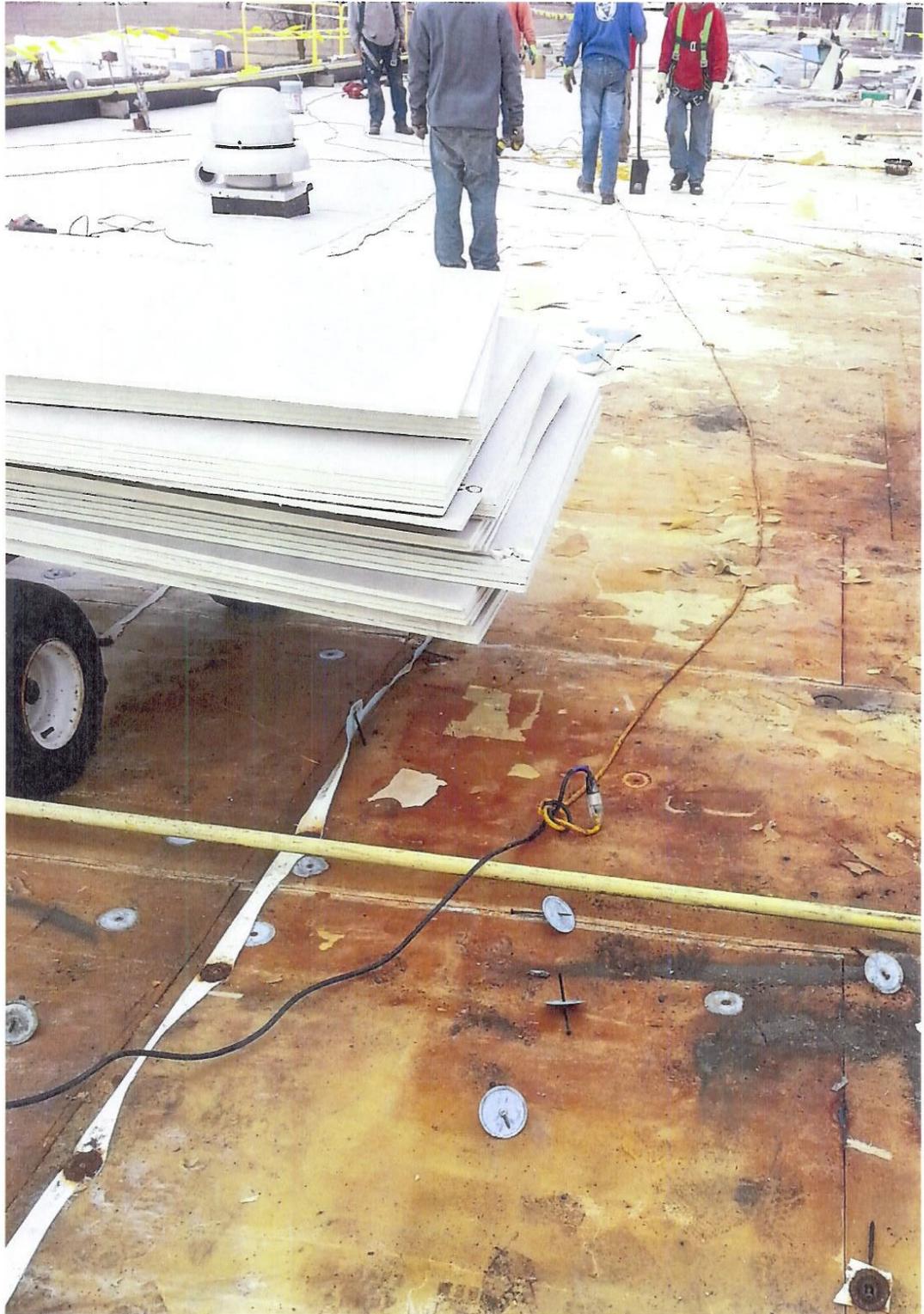
FARMERS' MARKET COMPLAINT

The City recently received a complaint regarding animals, specifically dogs, at the Kirksville Kiwanis Farmers' Market, held each Saturday from 7 am to 12 pm on the west side of the Square from May through October. Here is a copy of the complaint: "I would like to make some observations and suggestions about Farmers Market. The dogs are taking over and it will ruin the Market if they are allowed to attend. I really don't appreciate dog hair all over my food and to watch where I step for the dog feces ... how unsanitary. Then the idea of children getting bit by the not-child friendly dogs. We do have a dog park and that seems like the place for them, not at a Farmers Market." The Farmers Market is run by the Kiwanis. Kiwanis President Carolyn Chrisman reviewed these comments with the club. The Club has no plans to make any changes.

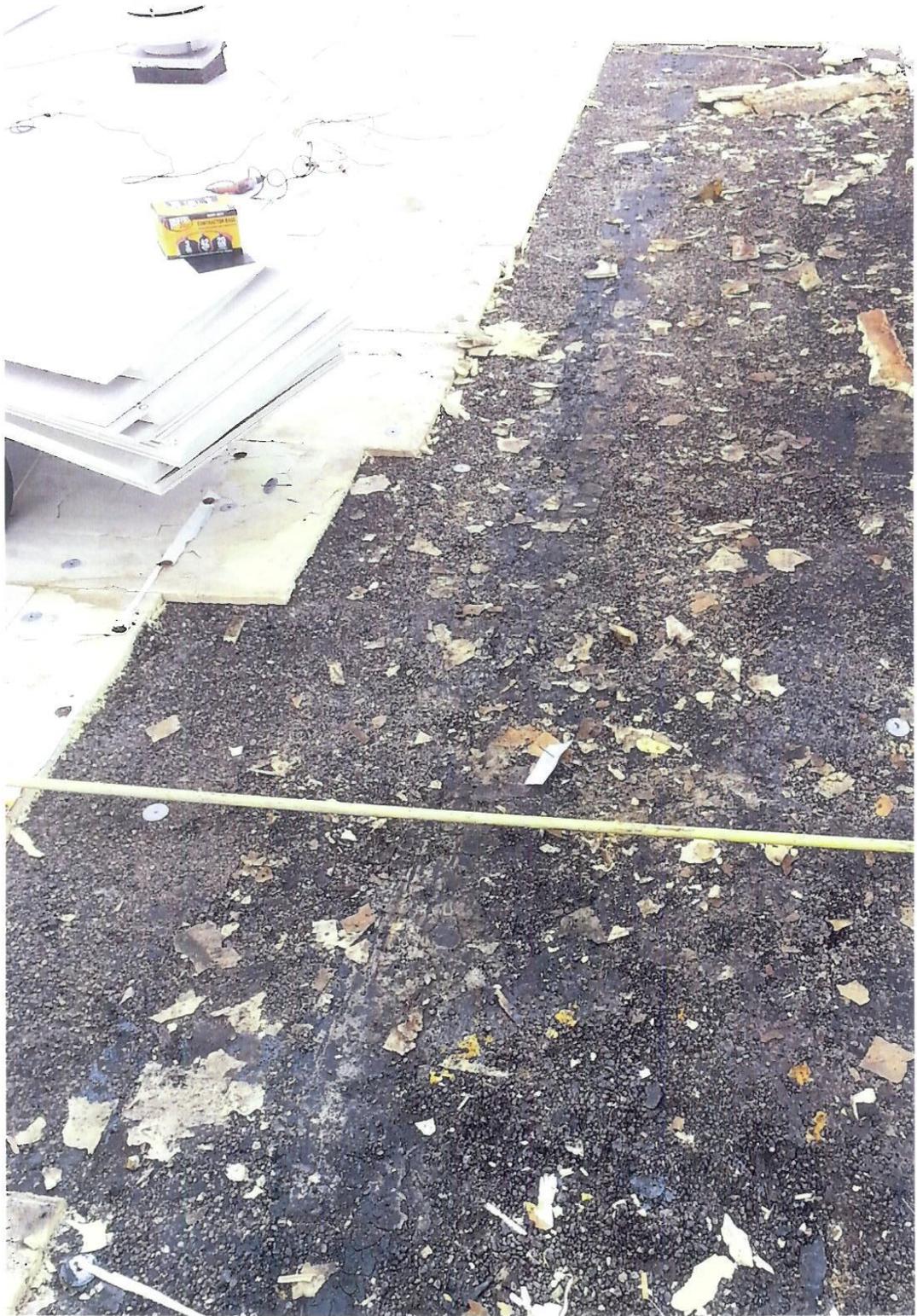

Re: Community Water Fluoridation Funding

Dear Mari Macomber:

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) is pleased to inform you that a contract in the amount of \$12,500 is to be awarded to your city for the purpose of purchasing fluoride in support of your community water fluoridation activities. Paperwork regarding the contract will be sent to your attention within the next 3-4 weeks and must be completed and returned before funds are made available.

Additionally, please be aware of the following:

- 1) This award is to supplement and not supplant non-Federal funding. This means you cannot reduce the amount of your own funds spent on fluoride during the contract year; this award must be used to purchase fluoride in an amount over and above your normal purchases and/or requirements for the contract period. If the storage of extra fluoride until after September 30, 2015 will create a problem for your community, you may decide it is not feasible to accept the award.
- 2) The Federal Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant which is funding this award has a 10% limit on indirect costs allowed for reimbursement. The 10% indirect cost rate will be included in the contract budget and will be reimbursed to you in addition to the amount reimbursed for fluoride purchased.
- 3) The fluoride must be delivered and invoiced to your organization by no later than September 30, 2015. A copy of the invoice from your fluoride supplier must accompany your request for reimbursement. Your request to DHSS for reimbursement is due no later than within thirty (30) calendar days of the contract ending date. The Department shall have no obligation to honor a reimbursement request received after the due date.

In The News: An Update On Missouri Library Funding

On Friday April 3rd, Governor Jay Nixon announced the release of \$43 million in withheld Fiscal Year 2015 funds. This included the currently withheld totals for State Aid and R.E.A.L for Missouri Libraries. In total, \$2,780,225 was released for State Aid and \$3,109,250 was released to provide internet access via R.E.A.L. We would like to thank all of our patrons who signed last month's petition encouraging Governor Nixon to release these funds.

Fiscal Year 2016 remains a concern for the Adair County Library and other Public Libraries across Missouri. As of April 16th, it appears there will be a 50% funding cut to R.E.A.L and State Aid. We remain committed to keeping our patrons informed as more information become available.
