CITY COUNCIL

The City Council, in the past, has met with the County Commission three times a year, and one to two times a year with a representative of TSU, ATSU, the School District and the Ambulance District to discuss items of mutual interest. Would the Council like to resume these meetings? If so, the next meeting would be on September 30 at 8:30 a.m. with the County Commission at the Courthouse. October would be with the school district. No meetings would be held in November and December due to the holidays. It would be helpful to know what times and days of the week are better for the Council as a whole when scheduling these meetings.

DREAM UPDATE

On July 22, 2008, Cherie Bryant and I met with Kim Martin, MDFB Community Development Program Manager, in Jefferson City to discuss concerns regarding the DREAM Initiative. Following a two hour meeting, Martin agreed to the following: 1) to provide Kirksville with more assistance and information with the Certified Local Government (CLG) process and thereby establishing a downtown Historic District. 2) To examine the requirements set by the Missouri State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) in relation to Kirksville property owners and the Historic Preservation Tax Credit Program (HTC) and the Brownfield Remediation and Demolition Tax Credits. 3) To research the possibility of moving the DREAM Design Guidelines to the forefront in order to speed up the process of providing physical building renovations. 4) To provide more technical assistance via workshops in Kirksville. 5) To provide assistance in the transition of KDIC into a larger role (i.e. identifying funding resources, assisting with the option of a part-time or full-time staff member). 6) To inspect

internal problems and professionalism issues with PGAV Urban Consulting. 7) To examine why the Missouri Department of Economic Development (MDED) has not been an active member of DREAM in Kirksville. Macomber and Bryant agreed to identify a potential project for DREAM to begin renovation/construction.

NO SOCCER FIELDS

The City received notification from the Land Water Conservation Fund that the soccer field project applied for the North Park Complex was not approved. Staff will determine where there were deficiencies in the application and consider future submission of this project. We have learned that the federal funds supporting this grant program are being reduced, so fewer dollars means fewer projects.

HIKE/BIKE/SIDEWALK PLANS

I had talked to the Council about implementing a hike/bike commission to review and evaluate the trails each year. After doing some additional research it appears that there was a temporary committee established by the Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission to identify and develop a long-range hike/bike trail map. Once this committee was complete with developing a plan, it was the responsibility of the Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission to review the plan each year with the Commission making a formal request of the Council to adopt the plan each year. This action took place for a few years and then the Airport and Transportation Commission was asked to review the plan along with the Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission and a joint recommendation would be made to the Council. This happened for a brief period. The process is documented in Council action, but was not spelled out anywhere. Therefore, instead of reinstating or establishing a commission for trails, it will be part of the Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission's review followed by the Airport and Transportation Commission. The hike/bike trail review should also include a review of the secondary sidewalk plan.

BULK PICKUP FROM FLOODING

Included is a press release that has been sent out to the local media regarding bulk waste pickup for property owners who have waste to dispose of due to the recent floods. The City is not offering to do a city wide clean up. Veolia offers bulk pickup to residences for a fee. We have issued the attached press release informing residents of the service that Veolia provides.

SALES TAX HOLIDAY

This weekend, the City will have the annual sales tax holiday on back to school items. This was a sales tax holiday passed by the State in 2004. When it was passed, cities were required to opt out of participating. The City of Kirksville did opt out of it. We later came back and asked the Council to consider opting in to determine if there was a significant impact on sales tax collection. We could not determine if there was an impact and so the City has participated for the last two years. Lawmakers established another sales tax holiday. Senate Bill 1181 establishes a new state sales holiday from April 19-25, on energy efficient (energy star certified) appliances up to \$1,500 per appliance. The tax holiday applies only to the state sales tax, but municipalities may "opt in" to the holiday by adopting an ordinance and sending it to the Dept. of Revenue 45 days before the holiday. The City Council needs to consider whether or not you wish to opt in to the "Show Me Green Sales Tax Holiday". The latest that it could be considered would be March 1 of next year to in order to get it to MDOR 45 days before April 19th. It is difficult to determine the effect of the tax at this point since it is so specific - an Energy Star appliance has to be purchased between April 19th and April 25th. It will benefit those who can plan to make their purchases between those dates, but most who need to replace an appliance won't wait.

SENIOR PROGRAMS

One of the goals the City Council would like for me to address is an evaluation of the programs offered and available to senior citizens. Included is a list of the programs available to adults, which includes senior citizens for the months of June and July. ATSU led a group of individuals who met on a regular basis to discuss senior services and program needs that would be available through the St. Andrews facility. When this facility was constructed one of the funding sources was a community development block grant for the construction of a senior center. We were getting requests from seniors to build a center, and this seemed like a logical way to accomplish this. There are events and use of the center, but not all seniors have taken advantage of the

facility. Included for your information is a copy of the rental policy that is used by St. Andrews for the facility. At present, the City offers cards there on Monday mornings. The YMCA is interested in looking to add some programs for seniors. The Director, Lance Dempsey, was looking for people who would share some ideas with him. We have given him the list of people who help us when we were starting. Some of the seniors who were requesting senior programs were not interested in a membership with the YMCA. Mr. Dempsey has been told this and he is considering his options. The letter from Mrs. Bartling talks about hearing about youth programs at the LPRC meeting of which she is a member. Since she is a member of this Commission it seems to me that the City has given her the opportunity and responsibility to bring her concerns up with this Commission and as a Commission they can determine if there is any thing further that needs to be done. I would encourage the Council to consider asking the Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission if there is anything they believe needs to be developed or work on to meet current needs.

HIGHWAY 63

MoDOT has not made a determination yet on the alignment. They are currently evaluating some details such as county road tie-ins, bridge locations, etc. Once they have made a decision they will let us know. In the meantime, we will wait to present an agreement to the Council that would outline our partnership with MoDOT on this project until they have made this decision.

AIRPORT UPDATE



AN RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF KIRKSVILLE ADOPTING A MULTI-YEAR PLAN FOR INSTALLING AND PRIORITIZING THE INSTALLATION OF A SYSTEM OF HIKING, BIKING AND JOGGING TRAILS IN AND NEAR THE CITY.

WHEREAS, the City's community strategic plan recommends the construction of a network of hiking, biking and jogging trails for recreation and pedestrian safety; and

WHEREAS, the construction of hiking, biking and jogging trails will enhance the quality of life in Kirksville; and

WHEREAS, the construction of hiking, biking and jogging trails is more likely to be completed in an orderly and consistent fashion if the city has a planning document detailing which sections will be built first, and outlining how different parts of the trail network will be connected; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of a multi-year plan for installing and prioritizing the installation of a system of hiking, biking and jogging trails will enable the City to coordinate other overlapping capital improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Kirksville Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission has recommended the adoption of such a multi-year hiking, biking and jogging trail master plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Kirksville, Missouri as follows:

Section One: A multi-year Master Trail System for the City of Kirksville is hereby adopted, as depicted on the attached map, which is made a part of this resolution as if fully set forth herein.

Section Two: The Kirksville Lakes, Parks and Recreation Commission shall annually review the multi-year plan, and make suggestions for its amendment to the City Council as the consider appropriate and in the best interests of the City.

Section Three: This resolution only establishes a generalized set of proposed routes. Actual routes, including the portion of each on existing street right-of-ways, the location of bicycle lanes on streets, and other design details are not a part of this plan and will be established separately for each trail section based on commonly accepted standards for hiking, biking and jogging trail construction.

Councilmember Morasco moved to approve Bill No. 96-116; seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Dudgeon. The motion carried by the following vote: Mayor Funk, aye; Mayor Pro Tem Dudgeon, aye; Councilmember Meneely, aye; Councilmember Morasco, aye; Councilmember Carpenter, aye. Nays, none.

SALES TAX HOLIDAY IN KIRKSVILLE

(Kirksville, MO) -- Shoppers will be able to save 6.475% on qualifying purchases when they shop locally Friday, August 1st – Sunday, August 3rd. With back to school shopping on everyone's mind it is a great time to make those purchases and save on the sales tax. Shoppers will save the State sales tax of 4.225% and the City sales tax of 2.25%.

Items that will qualify for the tax savings include: clothing – any item with a taxable value of \$100 or less; school supplies – not to exceed \$50 per purchase; computer software – taxable value of \$350 or less; and personal computers or computer peripheral devices – not to exceed \$3,500.

The Fiscal Year 2008 Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant application submitted for the above-referenced project has been reviewed by the State Inter-Agency Council for Outdoor Recreation (SIACOR). Unfortunately, this project has not been recommended to the National Park Service (NPS) for further review and approval. For this grant round, forty-eight applications were received with requests for over \$2.3 million dollars. The applications were very competitive and showed tremendous community support. Nine cities, counties or school districts will be recommended to the NPS for funding totaling approximately \$603,000.00.

The department greatly appreciates the time you took to complete your application and the interest in the Land and Water Conservation Fund grant program. The next grant cycle will begin in August of 2008. You may download the application at our website: www.mostateparks.com/grantinfo.htm at that time.

Policies

1. Statement of Purpose

The KSLC, Inc. operates the Kirksville Senior Living Campus' Senior Wellness & Community Center that is adjacent to St. Andrew's Apartments, at 500 S. Osteopathy Street; Kirksville, MO, as a senior community center for wellness, educational and public interest activities in keeping with the non-profit charitable purposes for which the KSLC, INC. was founded (November 2002). The Center is operated to the extent possible to involve citizens of all ages and backgrounds in a varied mix of activities. Fees and charges for the use of the facility are set by the KSLC, INC. with an effort to make the Center as open as possible to the public. The Center is in Kirksville, MO, and participation in activities is not limited to residents of this community. When competition exists for use of the space, the KSLC, INC. Board of Directors considers factors such as programming, fee structure and primary group that the program serves.

2. Space Available for Use

Interior: On ground floor, the nutrition/multipurpose suite, clinic, conference suite and public restrooms are available by permit from the KSLC, INC. In addition, on first floor the entry area and lounge are available for use by making special arrangements with KSLC, INC., including assurances that public passage will be possible through the area during that time. The multipurpose suite divider doors may not be used without making special arrangements with KSLC, Inc when renting the multipurpose rooms. Two meetings may be scheduled at the same time if the divider doors are used.

Exterior: The main entrance to the Center is through the east doors (those facing the Osteopathy Street Parking Lot). The west doors to the clinic and conference suite are available as well for limited parking. The south doors to the multipurpose suite are secondary exits and must always be kept clear. There is no implied right to use the land surrounding the Center when contracting for use of the Center. The kitchen entry on the south side of the building may be used by special arrangement with the KSLC, INC. Parking in the circular driveway is prohibited. The circular driveway is designed for drop-off and pick-up of people. Illegally parked cars will be subject to towing.

Parking.

The northwest parking lot (entrance to the Healthy Aging clinic) is reserved for residents and patients. The parking slots are on a first-come, first-serve basis for residents and patients whom may park in the west parking lot.

The east parking lot (entrance facing Osteopathy Street) is as following: Parking slots along the sidewalks both to the north and south of the entrance door is designated residents' parking. The center parking island is designated as community parking. Requests for staff (people who work in the

building but do not reside in the building) should park on the north end of the parking lot (parallel to the Energy Trail). All other slots are open parking: residents, physicians, patients, staff, and guests to the facility.

3. Public Safety

This is a tobacco free environment. No smoking, fires or candles are allowed in the Center at any time. Portable heaters may not be used. Propane tanks may not be brought into the Center. Those in charge of activities at the Center must know the location of emergency exits, fire extinguishers and the telephone.

4. Alcoholic beverages

Alcoholic beverages may not be sold at the Center. At private functions, alcoholic beverages may be served to guests if the host exercises due care for the guests' consumption of such beverages. It is recommended that the host consider risk management by hiring a licensed vendor for private functions. At public functions, alcoholic beverages may be served only by licensed vendors, and only to guests older than 21 years of age.

5. Dining Arrangements

Discussion will center on a catering arrangement with the Little Black Kettle.

6. Decorating

When decorating, renters may not hang decorations on the walls that will damage the wall. Confetti may not be used due to clean up difficulties. The use of glitter is not allowed. Balloons and streamers may be used but must be completely removed from walls and ceilings. Tape may be used if it is completely removed and does not damage the walls. Under no circumstances may tape be used on the floor. Renters are responsible for any damage caused by decorating.

The on-site administrator will provide a checklist for group to identify any damages to the area that they are renting and to note these damages on the checklist on the same day of the event. After the event, the on-site administrator will note any damages beyond those so noted.

7. Clean-up

Organizers of the event must remove all trash and debris (trash containers are located outside the south kitchen doors). A service fee will be charged if the Center is not completely cleaned following an event. If more clean up is required to leave the facility ready for the next renter, the organizers must arrange for custodial service through the KSLC, INC. In some cases, volunteers may conduct custodial work if they agree to use appropriate equipment and cleaning solutions as specified by the on-site administrator.

8. Security

The on-site administrator will determine the procedure for opening and closing the Center. Renters agree to assume responsibility for the security of the Center during their use and to properly secure the premises upon leaving. A service fee will be charged if the building is not properly locked.

Emergency doors must be kept closed. The rest rooms are not intended for general public use. The police should be notified if trespassing occurs.

Concealed weapons signage is located at the south and east entrance doors.

9. Equipment

When the renters provide equipment, it must be in good condition, appropriate for the intended use, and not cause damage to the facility. Written permission by the on-site administrator of storage of any equipment at the facility is required prior to the event. The KSLC, INC. assumes no responsibility for any such equipment. Tables and chairs are available for use when renting the Center. Those tables and chairs are for inside use only and may not be brought outside. Tables and chairs cannot be loaned out. When equipment is provided by the Center, the renter is responsible for using it appropriately and storing it properly. A service fee may be required depending on the equipment needed.

10. Insurance

Organizations using the Center may be required to have proof of insurance satisfactory to the KSLC, INC. and in certain circumstances will be required to add the KSLC, INC. to their policies as an additional named insured. The KSLC, INC. reserves the right to require insurance satisfactory to it in other circumstances depending upon the uses proposed.

11. Supervision

Organizations using the Center must provide evidence that qualified officers or staff will supervise the activities planned. The KSLC, INC. reserves the right to review the uses proposed for the Center and the supervision provided and to require such changes as it determines necessary for the safe and appropriate use of the facility.

12. Community Impact

Hours of operation are consistent with the Center's location in an adjacent residential neighborhood. The Center is not open between the hours of 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. and may allow extended hours. Written permission needs to be made with KSLC, Inc. Board of Directors for any exception to these hours. Outdoor activities must comply with city ordinances. Parking information should be included in program notices for the Center activities.

13. Operation Procedures

Permission to use the facility will be given through written agreement with the KSLC, INC., signed by the renter or its representative, who must be at least 21 years of age. The KSLC, INC. Board of Directors may delegate authority to run the center on a day-by-day basis as long as adequate policy guidelines are established for this administrative activity. The KSLC, INC. retains final authority on all aspects of the Center operation and retains the right to revoke renter privileges for failure to abide by the policies stated herein.

14. Reservations, Fee Structure, Payment, Cancellations

Reservations: The Center may be reserved at any time on a first come, first served basis. Generally, reservations may not be made more than one year in advance. The purpose of the Center is to be used by the residents and by the community. Therefore, scheduled events will permit maximum use of space. The calendar for reservations will be maintained at the Reception desk at the Center.

Fees: Rental time must include any necessary set up and clean up time. Rental charges are \$10/hr for any group. The fees will be waived for events sponsored by the residents.

For all other groups, waiver of fee is possible with approval of KSLC, Inc. Board of Directors prior to the use of the space.

A separate returnable security deposit may be required for events involving over 75 people.

Payment: Payment must be made in full at the time the reservation is placed. For contract renters, payment must be made on the first of each month for that month's reservations. Checks drawn on bank accounts, money orders, or cash will be accepted as payment. No credit cards or other forms of payment will be accepted.


Cancellations and refunds for renters will be made without penalty if notice is received at least one month prior to the date reserved. A full refund will be made by mailed check. If cancellations are made less than one month from the reserved date, no refund will be given unless the Center is successful in renting out the time period to some other group. In this situation, a prorated refund will be given based on the amount of time the second group fills in for the cancelled reservation.

For cancellations by renters with contracts, notice must be given one month in advance of any changes and a new contract signed reflecting the changed circumstances. The amount of the refund will depend on how the cancellation affects the minimum number of days required for a discounted rate. If the contract renter still has a minimum of ten days reserved or used, then a full refund for cancelled times will be made. If the cancellation results in fewer than 10 days being used, then a recalculation of payment due will be made and if any refund is due, the amount will be paid by mailed check. If the change results in additional costs, that additional sum must be paid at the time that the monthly fee is paid. Cancellations made with less than one month's notice will not result in any refund, unless the Center is successful in renting the time period to another group. If a substitute is found, a prorated refund will be made based on the amount of time successfully substituted.

It is with thanksgiving that I write this letter to the Circuit Court of Adair County. As you are aware, I was driving a 15-passenger van north on Highway 63 carrying 14 passengers on our way back from Bible camp outside of Jefferson, Missouri. I have never been in an accident before and was so thankful that the passengers in the vehicle we struck, as well as those in my van, were spared any serious injury. We praise God for His protective Hand on all of us, especially the young boy that had just moved from the corner of the van we had struck to the middle of the seat so he could better see the video screen.

The van two vehicles in front of me, driven by Mr. Beihl, caused the vehicle in front of me to stop abruptly. Mr. Utt said he was not sure that Mr. Biehl's taillight was working. Regardless, the taillights were covered with dirt which is why he had put his left arm out to indicate he was turning. Because of this, Mr. Utt was forced to decelerate very rapidly which did not allow me driving a heavier vehicle to stop behind him in time, thus we attempted to swerve around them. Please know that I believe the accident was mostly my fault, but there were other contributing factors and I would respectfully ask that these factors be considered when determining the final wording of the violation.

Through all of this there were many miracles for which we are thankful. Included in these miracles were the services provided by Officer Kellison of the Kirksville Police Department, the emergency paramedic team and fire department, the tow truck company operator, as well as the hospital staff. Office Kellison and his colleagues were very courteous and professional, both at the scene of the accident as well as during follow-up conversations.

The emergency teams' response was so rapid that the 14 of us were not completely out of our overturned van before they were there at the scene. They took great care of the younger people as thankfully there was more fright than physical pain.

The staff at NE Regional Medical Center welcomed us like family feeding us cold cut sandwiches and chips and providing a comfortable place for us to wait for family and

friends to come pick us up. We received excellent medical care and attention for which we are very thankful.

The tow truck operator and his family were very kind to us. He even asked his pastor to stop by the hospital to offer the church building and car if we needed it. For this we were so very grateful.

Even the lady from Custom Auto Body Shop, whose mailbox we ran over, was so gracious as we worked through the process of the insurance company getting her a new mailbox.

You should be very proud of the people of Kirksville; they represented your town admirably. I am sorry that we were involved in an accident there, but are thankful to have had the opportunity to meet so many of your wonderful residents.

Luke 10:25-29 sums up much of Jesus' teaching when he tells us to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind; and love your neighbor as yourself". Your community has shown great love to us for which we will be forever grateful.
