ALCOHOL SALES AT NORTH PARK

On April 18, 2016, the Council heard a report from City staff regarding the sale of alcohol at the North Park Complex. This report was prepared at the direction of the Council in response to citizen requests over the last few years. While the Council gave the verbal “go ahead” for staff to take the next steps necessary, the sale of alcohol at North Park would still have required final review and approval by the Council. Since April 18, the Council and staff have received input from citizens opposed to the sale of alcohol at North Park. In addition to a three-page petition signed by 45 individuals, and phone calls from the following stating opposition to the sale of alcohol (Betty Jones, Peggy Chow, Ellen Gillum, Damon Kizzire, Alfreda James, Rosemary Ford, Margaret Polovich, Louis Echemier), there are several emails that were received included with this Newsletter. One

resident did state their support for the Police Department, and another thanked the Street Division for their work, and another expressed interest in serving the alcohol if it approved.

SENTIMENTS CONCERNING NORTH PARK BEHAVIOR

Another sentiment that seemed to ring out loud and clear if you read the online posts was that the behavior of the adults was unacceptable. So regardless of alcohol, there were many who felt that the behavior of the coaches and some parents was not what it should be. Included with this Newsletter is a nice little sign that we may want to post throughout North Park that may or may not get the message across.

FOUNDERS DAY FRONTIER CELEBRATION AND TOMBSTONE DEDICATION

The Friends of Forest-Llewellyn Cemetery Committee and City staff have organized a Founders Day Frontier Celebration celebrating 174 years of the City of Kirksville! K-REDI TOWN HALL

Kirksville Regional Economic Development Inc. (K-REDI) will be holding their annual Town Hall on May 17, 2016, at 5:30 pm in the cafeteria at the Kirksville Senior High School at 1300 South Cottage Grove Avenue. The City Manager will be out of town on training but will make sure that staff is there to answer any questions that may be asked during the Question and Answer period.

GAO MEETING REGARDING USPS

The United States Government Accountability Office (GAO) held a in Kirksville on Friday, April 29, 2016, at 1:30 pm in the Economic Development Alliance Building. The purpose of the meeting was to receive feedback from the Missouri Rural Enterprise & Innovation Center (MREIC) on the United States Postal Service (USPS). In addition, to the usual community organization representatives, contact was also made with representatives from surrounding cities and counties, along with the Northeast Regional Planning Commission Director Dave Davidson who attended the meeting. The City and its economic development partners are committed to voicing the importance of the USPS to

the GAO, especially in light of small post office closures across rural America over the past decade.

MML ELECTED OFFICIALS TRAINING

The Missouri Municipal League is once again providing training for elected officials on June 9 and 10, 2016, in Columbia. This is training for all elected officials, not just newly elected officials. Conference sessions will emphasize the knowledge base all newly elected officials need to govern effectively, such as budgeting, ethics, economic development, planning and zoning, and more. The changes that continually occur in the municipal arena make this a Conference that all officials (not only newly elected) should consider attending. STATE SENATE DISTRICT 18 LOCAL GOVERNMENT DAY

State Senator Brian Munzlinger has invited county and municipal officials to his annual State Senate District 18 Local Government Day on June 28, 2016, at the Missouri State Capitol. The Senator has planned an informative meeting with a variety of state agencies that impact local government. More information will follow. TAP FEE INCREASE

On April 18, 2016, the Council voted to increase water and sewer tap fees to \$200 and \$100 respectively. On the Thursday prior to Council action, a property owner came in to make payment for six new water taps. The price was given to the owner, but City staff asked that the payment not be made yet as some paperwork needed to be completed. The Council took action on Monday, and then on the following Thursday, City staff called and told the owner they could come in and pay and that the price went up. Since we knew they had come in before the increase and gave a price and asked that they not pay for our convenience, it did not seem right to charge the increased amount. If the Council is agreeable with this, acknowledgement during the Council meeting of this support would be acceptable. In addition to this situation, one contractor did call expressing concern for the increase stating that the method used to justify the increase was questionable. He did ask that the City Council consider the percentage increase of things in the future since the business license fees had also gone up. It was explained that the business license fees had not been increased for 50 years and the tap fees another 8 years.

CITY LETTER OF SUPPORT FOR FLATS RTP GRANT

During the April 18, 2016, Council Meeting, the Council agreed to write a letter of support for the Forest Lake Area Trail System's (FLATS) application for Recreational Trail Program (RTP) grant funding through the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MoDNR) to construct a portion of the proposed trail. The letter was sent, and FLATS has expressed their gratitude for the letter and will keep City staff updated as the application move forward. City staff will update the Council as the application moves forward.

PUBLIC WORKS SAFETY MEETING

Representative Todd Foster with the City's risk management group, Missouri Public Risk (MPR), was in town this week. On Wednesday, Mr. Foster conducted a training session with all City supervisors, on how to deal with worker injuries when they occur. On Thursday, the Public Works Department, along with Parks Maintenance, attended a Public Works Safety meeting where Mr. Foster reviewed common accidents and injuries and how to avoid them, among other things. These meetings were held as part of a kick-off event to announce the change in personnel now responsible for the City's Risk Management. Sarah Halstead will be responsible for general liability and property damage, while Pat Meredith will be responsible for workers compensation. This change was done to free up time of Jeanie Ewing, Finance Supervisor, so she can provide more assistance to Finance Director Lacy King. In addition to the training, Mr. Foster toured the City park facilities noting appreciation for the work that has been done by the City to minimize liabilities.

MAKE KIRKSVILLE SHINE WEEK

The Make Kirksville Shine Committee continue to encourage City residents and business owners to "Make Kirksville Shine" from April 29 through May 6, 2016. The annual event reminds community members to demonstrate their community pride by beautifying and cleaning up their respective properties and surrounding area. Other dates for this event include June 5 through June 12, 2016, and September 10 through September 17, 2016. On April 23, 2016, The Make Kirksville Shine Committee and the City's Watershed Commission held a citywide litter pickup. City staff and Watershed Commission Chair Cindy Cooper coordinated the efforts from a booth in front of City Hall from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm. Three organizations that are already a part of our Adopt-a-Street program participated: Alpha Sigma Gamma, Show-Me 4-H, and the Student Public Health Association. There were also five first-time volunteer groups. In addition, additional groups planned trash pickup for this week. In addition to this event, the Watershed Commission is reminding citizens to dispose of their prescription medications responsibility by using the Adair County Sheriff's drug drop-off program. OATS SPRING LUNCHEON

Adair County OATS is holding their 12th Annual OATS Spring Luncheon on Tuesday, May 10, 2016, from 11:00 am to 2:00 pm at the Adair County Annex Building. The meal is \$6.00. There will be a raffle and door prizes for those who attend. All the proceeds go towards the purchase of new buses. OATS, Inc. is a not-for-profit 501(c)3 corporation providing specialized transportation for thousands of Missourians, including the rural general public, senior citizens, and people with disabilities in 87 Missouri counties. KIRKSVILLE ART WALK

The Kirksville Area Chamber of Commerce and the Kirksville Arts Association are once again hosting the Kirksville Art Walk on Friday, June 3 from 4 – 6:30 pm in Downtown Kirksville. The City participated last year and will do so again. Last year, City employee Dale Van Sickle displayed his Native American inspired artwork. This year, Ray Jagger, Police Officer and Lake Patrol Officer, has volunteered to share his photography. Ray previously worked as the photographer for Truman State University. We look forward to seeing his work. Immediately following the Art Walk will be the first “Summer on the Square Concert Series” concert on the County Courthouse lawn.

PROPOSED CDBG PROJECT DENIED

As last discussed in the March 30, 2016 Council Newsletter, City staff completed a preliminary Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Infrastructure application for Illinois Street improvement. The selected project was for street and drainage improvements on Illinois Street from Marion Street to Elson Street. The proposed improvements would have minimized flood impacts to residential and commercial properties and street intersections, improve street access, address public safety within the street right of way, and improve homeowner property value. City staff recently learned that the application was denied in that the City was not invited to submit a full application. Nonetheless, City staff have discussed potentially utilizing Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds from the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) for the project. The City currently has \$212,686.09 available in STP funds from MoDOT. According to MoDOT, once a design is completed and a good estimate is made, then the available funds may be obligated for the project. MODOT STP FUNDS

As last discussed in the April 13, 2016 Council Newsletter, and in the article above, the City currently has \$212,686.09 available in Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds from the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT). The Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission (MHTC) is looking to eliminate STP funds. Cities are either in one of two categories: Large Urban (Kansas City, Springfield, and St. Louis) or Small Urban for cities greater than 5,000 people. Each of these cities receive funding for transportation facilities. The City’s most recent use of the funds has been Osteopathy

and Franklin Street. According to MoDOT Area Engineer Amy Crawford, the City can file an official response on the importance of this funding for the MHTC's meeting during the first week in May. The Council will be asked to sign a letter sharing concerns with the MHTC.

MODOT LEGISLATION

There are currently two bills in the Missouri Legislature which would allow the State of Missouri to give roads currently maintained by the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) to Missouri counties to maintain. The two bills are SB1140 2016 and HB2032 2016. The Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission (MHTC) is not promoting this legislation, and thus far neither bill has been scheduled for a hearing. City staff will update the Council as the Missouri Legislature nears adjournment for the 2016 legislative session.

MISSOURI HIGHWAY FUNDING ADVOCACY

The Chairman of the Missouri Highway 13 Corridor Coalition, Bill Bernier, has proposed forming an alliance of regional highway advocacy organizations across the state to advocate for improved funding for our highways. Thus far he has met with a positive response. City Manager Mari Macomber recently presented to the Missouri Highway 13 Corridor Coalition on the success of the US Highway 63 Transportation Corporation's success in working with the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) to complete projects. City staff will keep the Council informed as this effort moves forward.

POLICE DEPARTMENT ELEVATOR

City staff have been working with KONE Elevator to repair the elevator in the Police Station. KONE Elevator recently informed City staff that they could not locate parts for the elevator (specifically, the broken wheel that keeps the cab in the tracks). City staff contacted the Missouri Stairlift Company of Columbia about possible repairs. They informed City staff that the Cheney Lift Company which made the elevator went out of business many years ago. The Company that bought Cheney is now also out of business. That Company, when they went out of business, had a parts division that some of the employees went together and bought, in order to continue to provide some parts and support for the equipment that they had worked on and built, etc. This company says they can no longer get these wheels either, so City staff cannot locate parts for this unit. City staff have asked Missouri Stairlift to give the City a quotation on removing the old elevator and installing a new unit that would be similar to what we have now. They plan to make an appointment to do so. At present the most frequent use of this elevator is to transport the cleaning cart, trash and recycling. The Police Department uses the elevator when an individual they need to finger print, etc. is not able to travel the stairs. Alternative accommodations will be discussed. Once the price of a new elevator is known we will determine cost-benefit of replacing it.

CITY HALL SIGNAGE

The new signage that was ordered for City Hall has been installed by the Building Maintenance Division. The new signage should make it easier for citizens to navigate City

Hall and find the City department they need to speak with. Please see photographs of the new signage attached to this Newsletter.

SWMD GLASS RECYCLING GRANT UPDATE

As last discussed in the March 16, 2016 Council Newsletter, City staff continue to move forward in implementing the Solid Waste Management District (SWMD) Glass Recycling Grant. The Engineering Division has finished up the plans and have submitted them to the Solid Waste Management District, who needs to now get them to the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MoDNR) for review and approval. City staff will update the Council as the project moves forward.

MINI-HOUSES UPDATE

On August 3, 2015, the City Council approved an ordinance change which allowed the construction of mini-houses within the City's mobile home parks. Since that time no mini-houses have been constructed. Local contractor Gary Rogers recently confirmed with City staff that he will not be constructing any mini-houses. City staff will update the Council if and when any contractor expresses an interest in constructing mini-houses.

MUNICIPAL COURT DIVISION COMPARISON

As the Missouri State Legislature has focused on the role of municipal governments, and specifically municipal police departments and municipal courts, in the context of the overall justice system in the wake of Ferguson, you may wonder how the City's Municipal Court Division compares to municipal courts of comparable municipalities. Please see the spreadsheet detailing that comparison attached to this Newsletter.

EMPLOYEE BIOMETRIC SCREENINGS

The Human Resources Department is approximately six months away from the employee biometric screenings, the individual results of which will determine the amount of insurance an individual employee pays. Those employees who participated in a biometric screening in January or October of 2015, however, are eligible for a free screening that is scheduled for May 4, 2016, from 7:00 am to 11:00 am. This is an opportunity for employees to check their "numbers" and make any necessary lifestyle changes, if possible, in advance of the official biometric screening in October 2016.

ROAD TAR TANKS FOR SALE

The City recently tried selling two tanks that were previously used to store road tar and are currently located at the Fire Department's Training Site on West Burton Street. 





COMMISSION SUPPORTS SHERIFF'S PROGRAM

(Kirksville, MO) – In honor of National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day, the City of Kirksville's Watershed Management Commission would like to commend the Adair County Sheriff's Department for their Permanent Drug Drop-Off Box Program. Kirksville is fortunate that our Sheriff's Department provides a service that allows citizens to drop off prescription drugs five days a week (excluding county holidays), fifty-two weeks a year! This Program provides a continuous opportunity for citizens to dispose of unwanted, expired, and unused medications in a safe manner.

Inappropriately disposed of medications can contaminate the water in our watersheds that supply our local drinking water. Prescription drugs should never be rinsed down the sink, flushed down the toilet, or tossed in the trash. The Watershed Management Commission would like to encourage citizens to dispose of their prescription drugs at the Adair County Sheriff's Office, 215 N. Franklin Street, Monday through Friday, between the hours of 8:00 am – 5:00 pm. As a community, it's important to use all resources available to protect our environment and keep our water source safe.

Good morning.

Hope all is well with you/yours.

In addition to being involved with the Emergency Services in Kirksville/Adair County, I am also the coach of a 16U softball team. I have been hearing much conversation and opinion as it relates to the alcohol at North Park issue.

I also realize that everyone has an opinion, and I am sure you are hearing many of them relative to this issue.

I wanted to share my opinion with you regarding this issue in hopes that you and the Council will take it into consideration when making the decision as to how we move forward.

Couple of thoughts:

As a 26-year veteran of the Emergency Services, I have learned/seen that there is nothing good that comes from serving alcohol in mass gatherings. Alcohol lowers the inhibition of people and causes them to act out in ways that they would not otherwise. I do understand that people could come to the park partially/if not entirely intoxicated and we cannot control that, however, we can control the convenience by which they can obtain alcohol. I think we would see the disagreements that already occur between parents; be it parent-to-parent, or parent-to-umpire, or parent-to-coach would only escalate and get more "heated" than they already are. I also believe you would have individuals exiting North Park that entered sober now leaving the park and driving under the influence.

As a parent and KBSA coach (and this is where my opinion gets personal) – I cannot see any reason for alcohol to be served at this "Park". This is a "Family Friendly" and more importantly...a "Kid Friendly" environment. The 2 do not go hand-in-hand. This is not a threat, simply a fact...if the City Council of Kirksville approves the sale of alcohol at North Park I (or my kids) will not participate in KBSA anymore. And, I have since I was 6 years old. I also know that of the parents of the 12 kids and 4 coaches that are on my team...the majority feel the same.

The only area that I can see where there is even a reason we should be having this conversation is.... REVENUE. Sometimes there are things that are much more important than money. And, I believe having a safe, friendly environment for our children to enjoy summer activities is one of those areas. I realize that the North Park is utilized for adult leagues as well, and maybe that is what is "driving" this issue. And, if you can tell me that the adult leagues occupy the majority of the activity at the North Park, then maybe I need to reconsider my stance. However (without all of the facts) simply based on what I see, it looks to me that the majority of the activity at the park is "youth" related.




